Spokane, Wash., Nov. 14.—(P)—Because Mrs. Thelma Mrochuck, 27-year-old Roseland, B. C., mother decided she could get along without her five-year-old son Edward, is recovering from a badly fractured leg.

When a fracture of the large bone in the child's lower leg failed to knit recently, he was brought to Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children here and surgeons, taking a piece of bone from his mother's leg made a living splint around the break, fastening it in place with biralium screws.

"I don't think it was anything special for me to do. It had to be done and I was glad I could do it," the mother said from her wheelchair today.
