

MATLACK PLANS LIVING MODELS IN YULE OPENING

Real Persons To Act Home
Scenes In Store Windows
If Protests Are Lacking.

After his plan for a public wedding had been ruled out because of protests, Jack Matlack bounced back yesterday with a new feature for the Christmas opening of Medford stores on November 26.

Matlack, director of the opening celebration, said he would feature living models in store windows for the opening provided there are no protests against this idea. If no objections are registered by 9 a. m. Tuesday, Matlack will proceed with arrangements to carry out the idea, he said.

This is how the idea works, Matlack explained: in a drug store window a mother will be seen going through the actions of giving Junior a much-needed dose of castor oil while daughter Mary waits to have first aid administered for bruises suffered when she fell down the basement stairs.

Out For Evening
In a women's apparel store window Milady will be seen preparing to go out for the evening to a formal event and later returning and reversing the process to retire, Matlack continued. In furniture store windows a family will be seen at home for the night, dad sunk comfortably in the big easy chair reading the evening newspaper, the children sprawled on the floor playing with their new Christmas toys and mother knitting patiently and contentedly before the fireplace, just as though mothers did such things any more, Matlack related. And so it goes: Madame getting beautified in a beauty salon, Joe College meeting with sethacks because of haste to get dressed for a special date, his dressing to be done in a men's shop window, and fathers and mothers being conducted on tours of toyland in department store windows.

Director Ducks
All the characters in these window portrayals will be real persons, Matlack emphasized. After announcing the new feature, he ducked into a bomb-proof shelter just in case any more explosive protests rent his usually calm demeanor. Assuming there will be no protests, Matlack scheduled the unveiling of the windows on his Christmas opening show for 6:30 p. m., the curtains to be rung down again at 8 p. m. The shades on all store windows are to be drawn at noon so that the windows can be dressed for the unveiling, he stated.

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Senator Alben W. Barkley (D-Ky.), who suffered a fainting spell last night, left by plane today for Louisville.

The 64-year-old majority leader collapsed just after he had finished an hour-long speech before a section of the Tennessee Education association. Refusing to go to a hospital, saying "I just fainted, that's all," he was taken to a hotel where a physician said the senator was suffering from a mild attack of tonsillitis and fatigue.

The senator told the educators that repeated parts of the neutrality act had "tied our hands and left free hands which would strangle us."

Portland, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Oregon counties yesterday advocated a post-defense public works program to be planned and administered by local governments.

Each county should form its own public works reserve committee to study possible projects, and prevent the "waste, extravagance and duplication of effort" characterizing the federal programs of the 1931-38 period, a resolution said.

The counties also advocated: The federal government take over all social security burdens for reservation Indians.

The state contribute more than 50 percent of the funds for the general assistance program if liquor revenue shows a substantial increase.

The state appoint a county court officer from eastern Oregon and another from western Oregon to the state board of forestry.

DOVER CAMPAIGN GETS UNDER WAY AT ROGUE RIVER

Rogue River, Nov. 15.—(Sp.)—The candidacy of Floyd K. Dover of Rogue River for the democratic nomination for congress in the new 4th district was officially launched here Friday night at a rally attended by approximately 50 party leaders and World War comrades of Dr. Dover.

Mr. Dover, introduced by Worth Smith, lecturer and writer of Rogue River, outlined his platform which he said includes efforts for development of the natural resources of southern Oregon, particularly mining and expansion of transportation to open up mining areas; enlargement of the social security program to give the aged a more adequate pension and support of President Roosevelt's foreign policy with opposition to a second A. E. F.

Sandy Blakely, vice chairman of the Floyd K. Dover for congress committee, acted as chairman at the rally and introduced the first speaker, Col. Bob Hopkins of Rogue River. C. W. Thornberry, chairman of the Josephine county democratic central committee, was present and spoke briefly.

According to Lester P. Mathes, general chairman of the Dover committee in Jackson county, rallies will be held before the holidays and an aggressive campaign will be conducted up to the May primaries.

Jupiter Plusplus emptied his sprinkling can over Medford and vicinity yesterday when rainfall from 4:30 a. m. until 4:30 p. m. totaled .83 inches. Rainboots, umbrellas, turned up collars, water rushing gaily down streets all evidenced "good old Oregon weather."

Rainfall to date for November totals 2.39 inches, which is 1.38 inches more rainfall than the average for the total month of November. Rainfall for the same period of time for November, 1940 totaled only 1.53.

Maximum temperature yesterday was 64 compared to 58 in 1940 while minimum was 47 yesterday compared to 28 in 1940. Forecast by the weather bureau was occasional rain today.
