

Cougars 14-13 Upset Victory Smears Stanford's Rose Bowl Hopes

TEXAS CHRISTIAN SQUAD DEFLATES BIBLE LONGHORNS

Minnesota, Duke, Texas Aggies, Duquesne and Irish Undefeated—Other Scores.

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The Horned Frogs of Texas Christian completed a deflation job on Dana Bible's Texas Longhorns today and left Minnesota, Duke, Texas A. and M., Duquesne and Notre Dame as the country's sole remaining major unbeaten football teams.

Held to a shocking tie by Baylor a week ago, Texas once more failed to find the combination and bowed to Texas Christian, 14-7, on a fourth period touchdown pass from Emory Nix to Van Hall.

Minnesota, the nation's No. 1 team a year ago and ranked in that spot in the latest Associated Press poll, hung up victory No. 7, a 34-13 triumph over Iowa's Hawkeyes in a hard-fought game. The Gophers will complete their season's schedule next week against Wisconsin.

Duke, battered North Carolina into submission, 20-0, and now has only North Carolina State blocking its path to an unbeaten, untied season and a probable bowl engagement. Duquesne, another bowl possibility, completed its regular schedule with a convincing 16-0 decision over Mississippi State, previously unbeaten, although tied.

Notre Dame, unbeaten but tied by Army, pulled another close battle out of the fire, whipping Northwestern, 7-6, in a bitter en-

agement before a sell-out crowd of 48,000 at Evanston. Angelo Bertelli passed to Matt Bolger, sub end, for the Irish touchdown and Steve Juzwik added the extra point which turned out to be decisive.

Missouri, virtually clinched the Big Six title by routing Oklahoma, 28-0, while Alabama moved on toward the southeastern crown with a 20-0 conquest of Georgia Tech.

In the east, Tennessee and Tulane chalked up intercollegiate victories for the southeastern conference. The former tripped Boston College, 14-7. Tulane breezed through the New York University, 45-0. Another New York City representative, Columbia, proved no match for Michigan, and succumbed, 28-0.

Bob Peters scored three touchdowns as Princeton toppled Yale, 20-6, in a Big Three engagement, while Cornell uncorked a fine offense in beating an old Ivy league rival, Dartmouth, 33-19. Harvard's strong outfit wore down Brown, 23-7, while Penn struck twice in the late stages to turn back Army, 14-7. Buck Morris' 74-yard run with 40 seconds to go gave Syracuse a 19-19 draw with Colgate. Penn State just made the grade against West Virginia, 7-0.

Ohio State and Wisconsin scored victories in Big Ten competition, the former taking Illinois over the hurdles in a close match, 12-7, while Wisconsin put over two fourth quarter touchdowns to trip Purdue, 13-0. Michigan State trampled all over Temple, 46-0, but Pitt subdued Nebraska, 14-7. Kansas upset Kansas State, 20-16, in a Big Six test. A southeastern conference game saw Auburn and Louisiana State play a 7-7 tie.

Utah virtually clinched the Big Seven championship with a 26-13 conquest of Colorado State. Brigham Young and Colorado played a 13-13 draw and Wyoming upset Utah State, 12-6.

ALBERTS' FAILURE TO SCORE EXTRA POINT DECISIVE

Oregon State Has Inside Track For Pasadena Tilt—Stanford Outplayed.

Palo Alto, Calif. Nov. 15.—(AP)—Washington State's Cougars, the real giant killers of the Pacific Coast conference, wrote one of the nation's great upsets into the football records by slashing out a 14 to 13 victory over Stanford's Indians today.

The fighting Cougars, passing and plunging with a fury that forced the favored Indians to make four goal line stands, virtually smeared Stanford's Rose bowl hopes in the turf of their own stadium.

They lined up as the short-enders but these burly warriors from the north had the T-formation boys on the defensive almost throughout the game.

Punt exchanges early in the first period put the Indians in the hole and with the ball 25 yards from goal, the Cougars rushed over a touchdown and converted the extra tally to lead from then on.

Take Early Lead At half-time they still led, 7 to 0. Stanford hopes soared when the Indians charged 68 yards to open the third quarter but they failed to make the extra point. Frank Albert, Stanford's all-America quarterback of last season and usually a reliable placekicker, toed the oval to one side.

Each scored touchdowns in the last period and each bagged the extra tally but Stanford still trailed by a point as the hands of the clock ticked off minutes, then seconds. The game ended just after Washington State broke up a desperate last-second Stanford passing attack from the 10-yard line.

Although the Rose bowl hopes of Stanford were practically shattered, the Indians still have a fighting chance. They're tied now, 14-14, with Oregon State and Washington, twice beaten.

Oregon State, however, holds the inside line, having won over both Stanford and Washington. The O. S. C. came through with a win today over California and by defeating Montana and Oregon in its last two games undoubtedly would get the Rose bowl bid.

The field was slippery from heavy morning fog that amounted to a drizzle and as was the case in the Oregon State rainy weather debacle at Corvallis, October 11, Stanford's fancy maneuvers from the vaunted T-formation begged down. Albert's left-handed passes failed off many times while his receivers lost footing at crucial times.

Cougars Function Washington State's offense however, functioned smoothly and the big Cougar backs poured through the left side of Stanford's line repeatedly for good gains. There was no question as to which team was the superior.

The Cougars punted their rivals into a hole at the start of the encounter. They got the ball 25 yards from goal, moved up five yards on a penalty and put together four plays to score. Bill Holmes, right halfback, loped around right end for a 14-yard touchdown run and his teammate Left-half Bill Sewell added the extra point by running the ball over.

After a scoreless second period, Stanford received the kickoff opening the third quarter and marched 68 yards to score. Albert passed 34 yards to Knelovic, the latter getting behind two Cougar defenders, to make

The Indians, trailing and with the minutes ticking off, came back with a rush. They got the ball on Washington State's 46. Albert passed 33 yards to Al Cole sub left half to put the oval 21 yards from goal. Three plays later, Bob Mitchell, right half, went over from the 3-yard line. Mitchell also placekicked the extra tally.

Washington State was a championship team today and earned the victory all the way. Four times Stanford's battered warriors had to make goal line stands.

WEAK PUNT GIVES BEAVERS VICTORY OVER BEARS 6 TO 0

Stubborn Battle Before Small Crowd—Joe Day Powers Touchdown.

Berkeley, Calif., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Capitalizing on a weak California punt, Oregon State's determined Beavers smashed across a third period touchdown today for a 6-0 victory over the Golden Bears.

The Beavers' hard-fought victory, coupled with Stanford's surprise loss to Washington State, threw the Pacific Coast conference lead into a three-way tie.

A disappointing gathering of 20,000 sat through a first half as dull as the skies overhead, but in the third period the Beavers found themselves on the Bear 35 by virtue of a punt by California's halfback, Bob Reinhard that traveled only five yards—his only bad kick of the game.

The Beavers were quick to seize their opportunity. Joe Day, substitute fullback, crashed through center for 12 yards, and alternated with Right Half Don Durdan in edging the ball up to the line in four thrusts through the fighting Bear line. Everett Smith, sub left halfback, powered through guard for the touchdown. The try for point by Warren Simas, sub quarterback, was blocked.

Both teams, fighting bitterly, were close to touchdowns earlier, in the second period the Beavers, aided by a 15-yard penalty against California, began driving goalward from the Bear 34. They reached the one-yard line, but there Fullback Lewis Shelton hit a stone wall at center, fumbled over the goal line and California Halfback Zacharias recovered for a touchdown to end the threat.

Shortly after the half two long passes from California's halfback, Billy Reinhard to End Ray Dunn carried 53 yards to the Beaver's four-yard line, but from there Reinhard was nailed for losses on two consecutive plays and a pass was batted down.

Back on the 18, the Bears tried a field goal from a difficult angle, but the kick by Quarterback Joe Merlon sailed under the cross bar.

The clubs appeared evenly

matched despite the discrepancy in their records. Both lines played stubbornly and long runs were scarce. They were even in first downs, nine to nine, and were about even in total yards gained, the Beavers taking a slight edge on the ground but the Bears ahead in the air.

Moscow, Idaho, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Montana university's Grizzlies, disregarding the rain and sloppy field which put a serious crimp in the enemy attack, plowed and splashed to a 16 to 0 victory over the University of Idaho Vandals this afternoon.

A 57-yard dash through the center of the Idaho line in the first quarter by left half Arnold Scott, who got perfect interference on the play, gave Montana all the points it needed to win.

The high scoring Eso Naranche, Grizzly fullback, added 10 more on a touchdown, point conversion and field goal to discourage any challengers to his position as leading Coast conference scorer.

Idaho, dreary and sparkless, its reverses and laterals stymied by the slippery ball, made only one concerted drive and that ended on the Montana 26.
