Johnston, both of the Union Printers home in Colorado Springs, Colo., at Pueblo, Colo., October 24. The ceremony was read by the Rev. William E. Bell, pastor of the Pueblo First Methodist church.

Formalities were waived by the District Judge J. Arthur Phelps who issued the couple a license immediately. The wedding was read in the judge's chambers at the court house.

Mr. Crane, 80, disclosed that the date marked the 23th anniversary of his former marriage, his wife having died about two years ago.

The bridegroom resided at Central Point and Medford for 23 years. He entered the printing trade at Fort Collins and later returned to Iowa where he took over a newspaper which his grandfather had started prior to the Civil war. During a trip to Arkansas, he was in an automobile accident, and injuries received in the wreck later admitted him to the Union Printers home at Colorado Springs.

It was here that he met Mrs. Johnston, 73, who also grew up in the printers' trade and who for 15 years worked as a printer on a Chicago daily paper. Illness sent her to the home about a year ago. She is a native of Hillsboro, Ill.

Mr. Crane participated in the early day Colorado gold rush and worked in a logging camp also. During his printing career he was editor and publisher of many papers in the middle west.
