

Orson Welles In "Citizen Kane" Headliner On Craterian Program

WELLES DIRECTOR AND PRODUCER OF BRILLIANT DRAMA

Career of American Citizen Portrayed; Picture Begins Three-Day Run.

An exceptionally brilliant parade of motion picture productions has been set for showing in the Craterian theatre, with "Citizen Kane," the much talked-about film starring Orson Welles, written by Orson Welles, directed by Orson Welles and produced by Orson Welles, as the lead-off hit starting a three-day run today.

As the title implies, the film deals with the career of an American citizen, one Charles Foster Kane, a man obsessed by a lust for power over life, money and love. The fate of many people, his own large fortune, and the hearts of two beautiful women are the objects of his conquest in the story, which is filled with a wealth of exciting incidents. Through a radically new technique of story telling, the brilliant and often clashing characterizations of Kane himself are seen through the different eyes of those who knew him, loved him, hated him during his years of creating a vast, one-man empire.

Welles tackled a difficult job in bringing to the screen a complete portrait of a colorful personage. But, by figuratively circling around and around the central character of Kane, each time revealing a new aspect of the man and his ideas and ideals, Welles presents a clear-cut picture of the impulsive, ruthless, charming, capricious individual he has chosen to describe. The result is rated a cinematic triumph, especially in the portrayal of Kane's relations with his two wives, both of whom loved him, and both of whom left him because he would not surrender to love except on his own terms.

TREASURY BLOW AT HIGHWAY AID BRINGS PROTEST

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A special economy committee was reported virtually unanimous today in the view that non-defense federal expenditures could be cut at least \$1,000,000,000 annually, but two key suggestions by Secretary Morgenthau—drastic reductions in farm and highway spending—drew immediate objections.

Morgenthau, a member of the 14-man committee, outlined his economy program at a closed meeting yesterday.

Besides suggesting that congress eliminate the projected \$139,000,000 federal-aid-to-state road appropriations for the 1942-43 fiscal year and make "drastic cuts in our agricultural expenditures," the treasury head said that non-essential reclamation river and harbor and flood control projects might be postponed; that the civilian conservation corps and the national youth administration might be wiped out or drastically curtailed and that vocational training activities might be consolidated in a new defense training bureau.

Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.), a committee member who told reporters he had been fighting for highway expenditures for 30

years, said the road program is "exceedingly popular" in congress and "I can't think of any other thing that would get as many votes" as highway aid grants.

As to curtailment of the farm spending, McKellar asserted that "we have been working for 10 years to raise farm prices, and we can't afford to injure them now."

STEINHARDT SAFE BRITISH REPORT

London, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A British announcement indicated today that a British United States-Russian party of 12 including Laurence A. Steinhardt, U. S. ambassador to Moscow, landed safely Thursday at the Caspian port of Baku on a flight from Kuibyshev, Russia. Concern had been felt for its safety since the start of the week, with rough weather in-

OREGON FARMERS TOLD OF DANGERS

Hood River, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Speakers warned the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation yesterday of the dangers awaiting agriculture in a war-time economy.

Farmers must refrain from raising prices of their crops, since prices on other necessary commodities in turn will go up with disastrous effects on agriculture, President Mac Hoke, Pendleton, said.

E. B. MacNaughton, president of the National Bank of Portland, advocated heavy taxation to prevent inflation.

Dr. Earl T. Maughn, director of research for the farm credit administration, said price-fixing probably would not be successful.
