The matter pertains to the company's supplemental application for extension of service.

Aviation Cadet—Lester W. Shepard of 606 West Clark street was among the 43 aviation cadets enlisted in the U. S. army air corps in Portland November 3, it was announced in a press release received yesterday from Lieut.-Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer for Oregon. It was the largest class ever enlisted in Oregon.

With the others in his class, Shepard started his pilot training immediately and if he completes the 7½-month course successfully he will be appointed a second lieutenant in the air corps reserve and go on active duty at once. Col. Hensley's release said. The colonel added that eligible young men making application now will not have to wait for selection as aviation cadets more than four weeks and will be called for the next training class as soon as the application has been approved. Full information about pilot training may be procured here from Sgt. Joseph W. Cushman, recruiter whose office is in the Medford federal building.
