Traffic Resumes As Flood Ebbs In Eugene Territory
The crest of a Willamette river flood swept northward toward Salem and Portland today. In its wake were scores of inundated farms and houses in the upper Willamette valley, where traffic was halted Saturday night by water that covered all major highways to a depth of five feet.

A record-breaking 3.7 inches of rain in 36 hours generated the sudden flood, sending the river roaring up from a zero reading to a depth of 15 feet, 3 feet above flood stage at Eugene.

Scores of shoppers in Eugene were cut off from their homes, and numerous motorists and residents of lowland areas were trapped. More than 100 persons were brought to safety by rowboats and a high-bodied lumber carrier.

The upper river began dropping after reaching its crest early Sunday, and highway travel was resumed.

Damage remained unestimated, but Eugene residents said it was the worst flood since 1927. The weather bureau reported this morning that the Willamette was rising slowly from Albany to its mouth but that the following stages were not expected to be exceeded by tomorrow: Albany 18.5 feet; Salem 16.0 feet, and Portland 10.0 feet.

The week-end storm crossed the Cascades and drenched the Redmond area with 1.33 inches of rain in 36 hours. Timberline lodge reported 25 inches of snow today and in northeastern Oregon Union county was blanketed.

Rainfall for Medford and vicinity since last Thursday has totaled 1.78 inches according to local weather bureau reports.
