

## NAZI THRUST INTO RUSSIA MIRRORED ON MAP OF U. S.

Geographic Society's Way Of Comparison Shows Similarity Of Nations.

Washington, D. C.—(Sp.)—If today's war front in Russia were mirrored on a map of the United States—that is, with the American east corresponding to the Russian west—the position of the battle lines and occupied regions in terms of United States geography would reveal striking similarities between the two countries.

"Roughly measuring invaded Soviet territory against the eastern United States," says a bulletin from the National Geographic society, "will show to what a considerable extent American economic geography reads like Russian."

"On our artificial 'transfer' war map of the United States, Moscow would coincide roughly with Indianapolis; Leningrad would find its closest counterpart in New York City; and the hotly-contested Donets basin front would be reflected approximately in east Texas."

**Extent of Drive**  
"The mighty 600-mile push of the German armies toward Moscow, Soviet capital, would be mirrored by penetration from the Atlantic coast about to Indianapolis, important industrial city and capital of Indiana. Washington, D. C. is less than 150 miles inland from the Atlantic coast. For purposes of this contrast it is to be assumed that the government would long since have been moved to a temporary situation somewhere west of the occupied regions. Kansas City would match in location the new emergency

Soviet administrative center at Kuibyshev on the Volga. "In position and in importance to their respective countries, New York City and Leningrad have many resemblances. Each is normally its nation's leading port and each has important munitions and other defense-industrial industries, shipyards and trade offices. New York is the largest city of the hemisphere; Leningrad the second city of Russia. New York is about as far from the northeastern border of the United States as is Leningrad from the nearest German territory."

**Half of Oil Lost**  
"As the German forces have made their deepest thrusts in the south 800 miles across the Ukraine to the major Russian industrial region of the Donets basin, so fighting would have reached eastern Texas and America's most productive oil fields if the front were transposed to the southern United States."

"In a mile-for-mile analogy, if we assume loss of eastern Texas, the United States would have been deprived of almost half its oil production (Russia's oil sources are still intact), most of its best hard and soft coal mines in Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio (with the Donets basin go the Soviet's greatest coal mines), most of the industrial centers of the east and nearer middle west (Russia's Ural and Siberian industrial centers are still untouched; factories still are in Russian hands in the eastern Donets and Moscow areas)."

"While Russia, however, has lost her chief iron supplies with the western Ukraine, the United States' main source of that essential ore, in the iron ranges of the western Lake Superior region, would, in our comparison, still be far back of the fighting front."

**Overrun Regions**  
"Detroit, Chicago and St. Louis, lying beyond the overrun regions, would match the Russian towns of Ryazan, Gorki and Saratov. Giant manufacturing cities of the 'occupied' area—Boston, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, Cleveland and Cincinnati—would be roughly comparable to German-captured Kiev, Odessa, Kharkov, Zaporizhe, Nikolaev and Stalino. The shipyards of Maine, Massachusetts, the Delaware river and southeastern Virginia would correspond to the Soviet shipbuilding centers on the Black sea and the Gulf of Finland. Steel centers in western Pennsylvania and central Alabama would have their counterparts in the Ukraine."

"The Volga would find its twin in the American Mississippi, both in central position and in importance to internal trade and communications. And, as most of the Soviet Union's people are concentrated in European Russia west of the Volga, so the bulk of United States population lives east of the Mississippi."

"The barrier of the Appalachian uplands would have no equal in European Russia; its rugged natural defenses are much deeper and much nearer the country's edge than the comparable Ural mountains, which lie 1,500 miles from the Soviet western border. Aside

from the matter of situation, however, the Ural industrial and mining area, which Russia has been developing feverishly for some years, can be compared in many ways to the United States Appalachian region. But in actual productivity the almost-lost Ukraine, with the iron mines of Krivoriog, the Dnieper manganese deposits and the Donets coal, presents a closer parallel.

**Grain Left**  
"If the Russians lose all their Caucasus oil fields, the loss will be comparable to the United States having to abandon the Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas fields in addition to those east of the Mississippi. Both nations would have considerable oil supplies to fall back on. The United States position, with the rich California and other far-western state wells still untouched, would be better than the Russian in this respect. For it is thought that the Soviets have not yet largely developed their oil resources in the Volga-Ural, Emba and Asiatic areas."

"Although the Ukraine wheat production now represents only about a quarter of the total Russian crop, the still serious loss of Ukrainian wheat fields would as yet have no counterpart in this area-for-area comparison with the United States. For the great American wheat-growing regions all lie to the west of the Mississippi river, from central Texas north to the Canadian prairie provinces. Even the rich corn belt extending from Ohio to Nebraska would be occupied only on its eastern fringes. Likewise, east of Moscow and the Ukraine, Russia has vast agricultural lands as yet untouched by war."

## ROOSEVELT SIGNS SHIP ARMING BILL

Washington, Nov. 18.—(P)—President Roosevelt signed the ship arming bill late Monday. It became law upon signature. Mr. Roosevelt acted soon after the measure reached him from congress, where it had encountered stiff opposition.

Wiping out most of the remaining key sections of the Neutrality law, the new statute not only permits the mounting of guns on American merchant ships but allows them once more to sail the seven seas—into belligerent ports and combat zones.

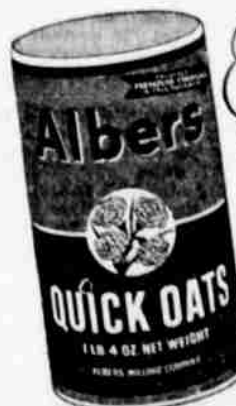

Tacoma, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Operating and maintenance employees of the Tacoma public school system today threatened to strike November 24 unless wages and working conditions were adjusted.

About 73 employees, including janitors, who belong to the AFL Engineers' union, would be involved.

Robert Ross, union business agent, said the strike was threatened "only after repeated efforts of the employees to reach an agreement with the school board over working conditions, hours and wages, had failed."
