

SCOUT EXECUTIVE AND GOV. SPRAGUE SPEAK TO ROTARY

Boys' Leader Emphasizes Training Need—Governor Notes State Prosperity.

Added emphasis must be placed upon the training of youth if America's destiny is to be achieved. This was the keynote of an inspiring address delivered before the Medford Rotary club at the Hotel Medford Tuesday noon by Walter R. Whidden, deputy regional Boy Scout executive of Portland. Whidden was introduced by Kenneth Wells, Scout executive here.

The recent book "Education for Death", dealing with youth training in Nazi Germany, was quoted by the speaker. Here in America we should have "education for living", Whidden said. He pointed out that this education should be along the lines of character, building with stress upon American principles of freedom and fair play. In this shrinking world there is not room for the training of young folks the Nazi way, and the American way, Whidden warned. Only one can survive and it is up to the American people to awake to the need of perpetuating the American way.

Governor Guest
Governor Charles A. Sprague was a guest at the Tuesday Rotary meeting and gave a brief address in the spirit of the Thanksgiving season. There is general prosperity in this state, the governor said. Crops have been good and there is every reason to expect readjustments in the lumbering industry soon. Oregon communities generally have not experienced defense booms, and thus will be saved the damaging population adjustments when the present emergency has passed, Governor Sprague reminded the Rotarians.

GRANT MORE TIME FOR DAM PROJECT

An order granting the Pacific-Portland Cement company an extension of time for completion of the hydro-electric project in Rogue River near Gold Hill was filed in circuit court yesterday by the state engineer's office.

The state game commission filed a protest against the time extension on the grounds the state engineer had no jurisdiction to grant the extension and that the project was detrimental and would impair fish life and migrations in the Rogue river. The cement concern, formerly the Beaver-Portland Cement company, set forth an appeal of the state game commission from an injunction hearing against the power development was still pending before the state supreme court, and it would not be practical to go ahead with construction work until a decision had been handed down. They asked for a time extension until October 1, 1943.

The state game commission has served notice of an appeal to the Jackson county court, on the state engineer's order extending the time.

Cornhusking Champ Wins By Whisker

Ontario, Ore., Nov. 19.—(P)—By eight-tenths of a bushel, Claude Campbell, Nampa, Ida., successfully defended his title of champion cornhusker of the Pacific northwest yesterday.

AUTOMOBILE SHOW IS ADDED FEATURE FOR YULE OPENING

Street To Be Roped Off For Outdoor Display and Surprise Numbers, Is Word.

A street automobile show was an added feature today to the celebration marking the opening of the Christmas shopping season next Wednesday, November 26.

The city council last night approved the request of the Medford Merchants association to rope off two downtown blocks for the display of new motorcars from 6:30 to 8:30 next Wednesday night. What street should be blocked off, whether Central avenue or Main street, and other

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details of the arrangement were left by the council to the streets and roads and public safety committees, the fire chief and the police chief to work out.

Two Blocks Needed
The request was presented to the council for the merchants by John P. Moffat and Ray Baker. Mr. Moffat said the merchants would like to have the two blocks roped off to "display automobiles and other things." He did not amplify his statement about "other things," but Jack Matlack, director of the Christmas opening celebration, had previously indicated that the merchants were working on some surprise features.

Mr. Baker explained that the new cars would be lined up in the center of the street so that there would be lanes on each side for the transit of any emergency vehicles such as ambulances or fire engines. He stated that the merchants would pay for whatever extra policing might be needed.
