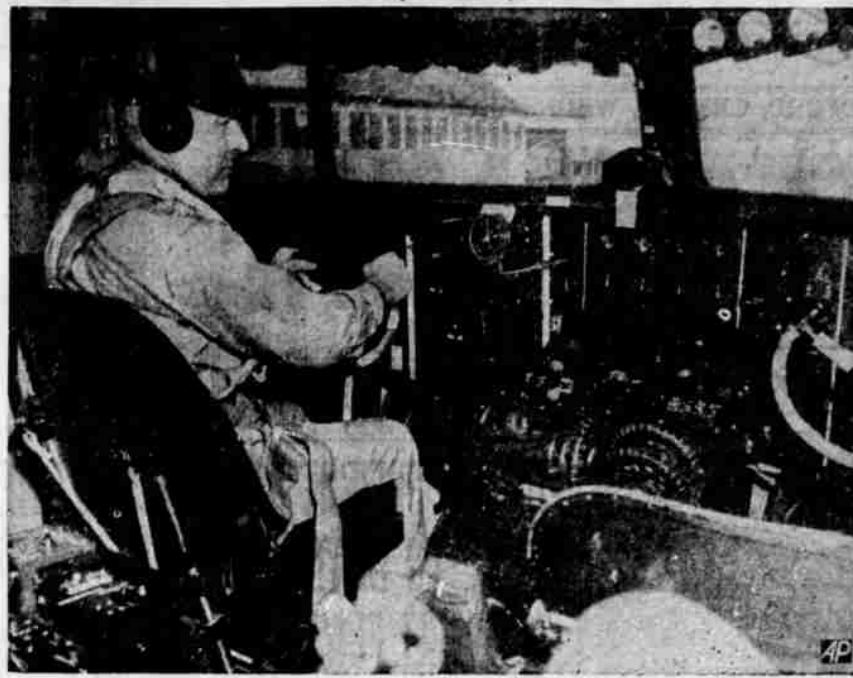

COUNCIL IS TOLD CITY RESTAURANTS ARE COOPERATING

Compliance With New Ordinance Found On Inspection Health Committee Reports.

Medford eating places are co-operating splendidly in enforcement of the control ordinance recently adopted, Larry Schade, chairman of the public health committee, reported to the city council last night.

State inspectors, Mr. Schade said, made an initial inspection of eating places under the new ordinance a few weeks ago and explained provisions of the ordinance where changes had to be made for compliance. On a subsequent inspection Monday and yesterday, the inspectors found the restaurant owners cooperat-

ing fully by carrying out the recommendations made at the previous inspection, Mr. Schade said. Another inspection, he added, will be made soon.

Defer Punchboards

Consideration of a proposed ordinance to license punchboards was deferred.

On recommendation of the city planning commission, the council passed an ordinance changing to a conditional light industrial zone class 5 the lots recently purchased by the Ralph O. Stephenson company at Court street and McAndrew's road.

After no one had appeared at a public hearing on the question, the council voted the vacation of a small piece of land on South Oakdale avenue. Hearing on the vacation of the original Euclid Park addition plat was postponed to the council meeting December 2.

C. H. Herman, chairman of the license committee, informed the council he had been handed a number of applications for
