

BERSERK BUCK IS BROUGHT DOWN BY OFFICER'S BULLET

Two Day Rampage of Pet Brings Injury To One And Fright To Scores.

A four-year-old pet buck deer that ran berserk for two days was shot and killed by a state policeman yesterday afternoon, after it had injured two persons and frightened many others.

The deer, police said, was owned by Frank Denman of Route 4, who had left it in care of Ray Dallaire, a neighbor, while on a trip back east.

Monday, police said, the deer broke out of its pen and attacked Jasper B. Hibbert, 63, a neighbor, when he approached it with an apple in an attempt to get it back into its corral. Hibbert was knocked to the ground and trampled, suffering a broken hand and bruises and was taken to a hospital.

The deer then fled and when next seen was roaming along the creek bottom back of the Medford Concrete Construction company, 1320 North Riverside avenue. About eight children, believing the deer was harmless, got too close to it and were chased helter skelter up on stacks of concrete pipe.

Avoids Lasso
Russ Semon, employee of the construction company, obtained a rope and attempted to lasso the animal, but each time the noose fell around the deer's neck it broke away before Semon could slip the knot tight. The deer then chased Semon and several other employees up on the pipe, Semon being skinned on the leg when the buck welded its short, jagged horns.

State police were finally called and a shot through the heart ended the deer's short burst of freedom. The meat was turned over to the Salvation Army.

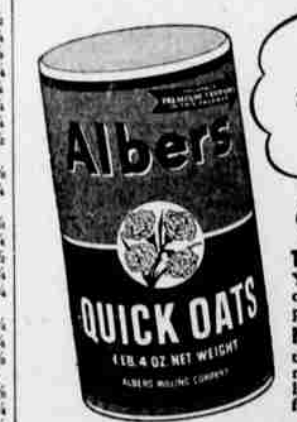
