Juzwik Should Receive Heisman Football Trophy

Balloting has started to select for the Downtown Athletic club of New York City the 1941 winner of football's greatest individual award, the Heisman Memorial trophy given annually to the player the nation's sports writers choose as the outstanding college football player in the United States.

This year's winner will follow such illustrious predecessors as Yale's Larry Kelley, Yale's Clint Frank, Davey O'Brien of Texas Christian, Nile Kinnick of Iowa and Michigan's great Tommy Harmon.

The trophy sponsors have been kind enough to ask this department to cast a vote, which we did this very day. And, who was our selection for the award? A fellow by the name of Steve Juzwik, who plays halfback for a team called Notre Dame.

Juzwik, as all rabid gridiron fanatics know, has been mighty terrific for Frank Leahy's Irish. With Bertelli, the sophomore passing sensation, he has been largely responsible for the great success of the current Notre Dame eleven, which will enjoy an unbeaten season if it hurdles weak U. S. C. Yes, we think Juzwik is the number one player in the nation.

Our second choice was Billy Sewell of Washington State, and our third was Urban Odson, 245-pound tackle for Minnesota's Golden Gophers. Sewell has sparked the Cougars on their great comeback drive, and is probably a cinch for All-Pacific coast conference honors and might even be named an All-American. Odson is the terror of the Western conference.

Speaking of balloting, coaches and sports writers in Medford, Klamath Falls, Ashland and Grants Pass are voting at present to aid the Mail Tribune in selecting its eighth annual All-Southern Oregon conference eleven.

Voting are Coaches Bill Bowman of Medford, Buck Hammer of Klamath Falls, Justin Weakley of Grants Pass and Frank O'Neil of Ashland, and Scribes Jim Welch of the Grants Pass Courier, Larry Hunter of the Ashland Tidings, Bob Leonard of the Klamath News and Herald and Bill Hulen of the Mail Tribune.

Each coach and writer will select his own all-conference first and second teams. Two points will be given every player getting a first team vote, and one point will be given those selected for a second team post. The Mail Tribune will tabulate the points of every player and place him on either the first

or second team according to the number of points he receives.

There can be only three possible first-team repeaters from last year's eleven, as eight of the 1940 all-stars were graduated and didn't play this season. The trio who can win first team berths for the second straight year are Bill Wall and Ike Orr, both of Medford, and Ashland's Charlie Jandreau. Wall made a tackle position in 1940 and Orr and Jandreau were placed in backfield posts.

On last year's second team, only two played again this season. They were Cato Wray of Medford and Eugene Love of Klamath Falls. Of last year's honorable mention nominees, four played this year. They were Bud Provost of Ashland, an end in 1940 and a fullback this year; Guard Bob Mitchell of Medford and Clyde Garrett of Ashland, and Center Russell Hawk of Ashland.

LUTES, MIDLAND SIGN FOR CLASH

Fremont, Neb., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Unbeaten Midland college agreed today to meet Pacific Lutheran of Tacoma, Wash., in a post-season football game at a time and place not yet set. Midland officials said they agreed with Coach Cliff Olson of Pacific Lutheran a neutral site would be preferable, but Olson was also checking the possibility of using Lutheran's stadium. The Washington school, unbeaten thus far, has two games left on its schedule.

Midland's decision came before plans had jelled for a "backyard bowl" game with Kearney, Neb., Teachers, also undefeated.

GAME SCHEDULED FOR 10:30 A. M. AT GRANTS PASS

Ex-Tiger Stars Declare Themselves Ready For Foe—KUIN To Broadcast

Former gridiron heroes of Medford high school met in the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce last night and enthusiastically declared they were ready to clash with the Grants Pass alumni in a Thanksgiving day contest at Grants Pass tomorrow morning. The game will start at 10:30 sharp, and will be broadcast by station KUIN, Grants Pass.

The local lads will leave from the chamber of commerce at 8 a. m. tomorrow, and all ex-Tornado players desiring to make the trip and to the turf once more are asked to meet at that time. Uniforms and shoes will be borrowed from Medford high. Leo Sakraida, fullback on the 1935 and 1936 Tiger eleven, was in charge of the meeting, and he was ably assisted by 300-pound Bill Clute, former Tornado tackle. A dozen others pledged themselves to prove that Medford high's domination over the Cavemen the past several years was no fluke, and that this mastery still holds good out of school.

Strong Roster
The roster of the alumni team will probably look something like this: Ends, Dick Woodcock, Stan Winter, Bob Wilson, Fred Gunnette, Don Monteth; tackles, Art Winetrou, Bill Clute, Mickey Miller, Ray Offord, Eldon Grow; guards, Floyd Baker, Al Wray, Warren Loffer; centers, Sam VanDyke, Harry Thurman, Ardo Stocks, Tommy Wright; backs, Rodney Stead, Dale Haley, Don Wilson, Leo Sakraida, Bud Sakraida, Bobby Ettinger, John Saulsberry, Bill Caples.

Not all these players attended the meeting, but it was expected most of them would rally to the call and show up at the chamber of commerce in the morning. Winetrou, who weighs 240, is not a Medford "alumnus." As a matter of fact he is a graduate of Grants Pass high. However, he lives here and wants to play with the locals, so they'll probably disguise him as a water boy or something and trust that Grants Pass doesn't recognize their own former star.

Another "ringer" Medford will attempt to stick in the fray is Al Wray, a graduate of Stockton, Cal. high. He plays left field for the Craters in the summertime, so will probably be disguised as an outfielder.

The Grants Pass team will be captained by Jim Orr, center and former Oregon State college regular. ROSE BOWL FEVER INFECTS CAMPUS OF OREGON STATE

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Rose Bowl fever still was forbidden among the Oregon State football players today, but the campus was full of it, and many an old grad practically was packing up for Pasadena.

Once again the Beavers, far western Cinderella team of 1941 and only school among the founders of the Pacific coast conference never to make the New Year's day game, were on the bowl ballot and clear up at the top, too. Only two teams stand in their way—Montana, which looks easy, and Oregon, which doesn't.

Since they defeated California, 6-0 last Saturday while Washington State knocked off Stanford, 14-13, the Oregonians hold the inside lane. OSC, Stanford and Washington each has lost two games but OSC defeated the other two. In cases of ties, it has been the custom to give the bowl bid to the team that defeated its co-champion or champions.

Prep Elevens Near Season's End This Week; Ashland Plays

A schedule to quail the hardest will virtually wind up Oregon high school football play this week.

Arlington, Amity and Newport, all undefeated in class B competition, will meet in a series of contests that may determine the B championship of the state. Amity earned its ninth win of the season Monday by polishing off Dayton, 33 to 7, and will vie with Arlington, 10-game winner, at McMinnville Thanksgiving day.

Newport will seek its eighth win against Toledo the same day, and will meet Arlington Saturday.

Among the major powers, who play but one game a week, undefeated The Dalles travels to Pendleton Thursday. If the Indians win that one, and a game next week against Medford, they

will be in line for a post-season game with Myrtle Point for the state championship.

Albany's Bulldogs will invade Eugene on Thanksgiving, seeking a win that would enable them to tie Salem and Corvallis for the No Name league title.

Other turkey day games will see Everett, unbeaten in Washington, at Salem, the Pacific University freshmen at Corvallis and Roseburg at Ashland.

MECHAM LEADING PUNTER ON COAST

Seattle, Nov. 19.—(AP)—It's unlikely that any Pacific coast conference gridder will surpass the individual statistical standards of 1940 by the time the current season ends—unless it's Curt "Curly" Mecham of Oregon. Official conference figures from the American football statistical bureau show four of 1940's five high marks comparatively safe from assault.

Only in punting has last year's top figure a chance to be topped. Norm Standlee of Stanford had a 42.65 average last year. Mecham has been leading the coast for weeks and now has a 41.02 mark which he conceivably could better in his closing three games.
