## RELOCATED ROUTE AROUND SHASTA IN USE NEXT SPRING

Pit River Bridge Steel Now  
Connected — Is Highest  
Decker In World.

Sacramento, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Main line trains of the Southern Pacific will begin using the new 30-mile relocated route around the Shasta reservoir area next spring, U. S. bureau of reclamation engineers predicted today.

Workers have just completed the closure of steel on the central span of the Pit river bridge 14 miles north of Redding and riveters are at work now linking the joints on the highest double-deck bridge in the world.

Giant connecting pins fastening the two huge cantilever arms of the bridge in the center were driven into place last weekend by steel riggers who did their job at an elevation about 500 feet above Pit river.

**Four-Lane Highway**  
The Pit river bridge unit of the Central valley project is designed to carry two railroad tracks on the lower deck and a four-lane section of U. S. highway 99 on the upper deck across the deep Pit river canyon. It will have an overall length of 3,588 feet—about two-thirds of a mile.

Meanwhile, the reclamation bureau said work is going forward on auxiliary features of the 30-mile railroad relocation which will replace the existing 37-mile canyon line. Part of the recent route will be flooded out by Shasta dam. Engineers said all roadbed grading, all 12 tunnels and seven other bridges have been completed, with track laid on the entire line except the Pit bridge and a few sidings.

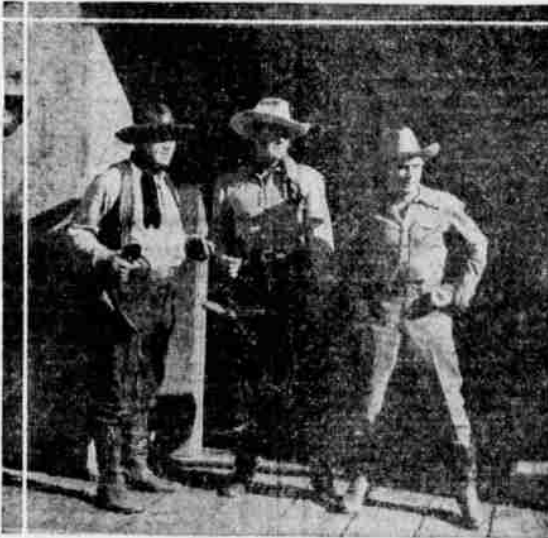

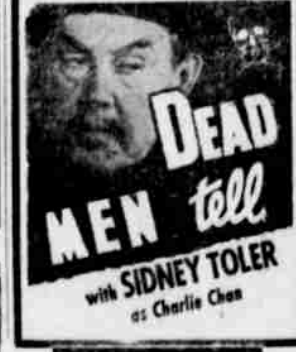

## ED ANDREWS OF OPERATIC FAME PASSES IN EAST

Former Medford Man Who  
Toured Country In Own  
Company, Succumbs At  
Ripe Age.

Word was received here yesterday of the death in Mankato, Minn., of Ed Andrews, long time resident of Medford. Funeral services will be held in Mankato tomorrow. Mr. Andrews came to Medford in 1905 and resided here about 30 years before returning to his home state, Minnesota. He was 84 years of age at death.

Mr. Andrews' interest in the Rogue River valley was instrumental in bringing many Minnesota residents to southern Oregon. He was particularly active in musical circles in Medford, directed several operas here and organized the community chorus which was popular for many years. With his brother, George Andrews they operated and took part in the Andrews Opera company which toured the United States and many of the friends, made through his travels later came to Medford. Through his interest in music, his daughter, Caroline Andrews Werner followed music and became nation-

ally known for her vocal abilities, particularly in the east.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Richard Werner of Williston Park, Long Island; two sisters, Mrs. C. A. Parker of New York City and Mrs. Florence Clayton of St. Paul, Minn., a sister-in-law, Mrs. William Andrews of this city and two nieces also residing in Medford. Mrs. Edith Stevens and Mrs. Conro Fiero.
