

VOLUNTEERS SAVE COUNTY DRAFTEES FROM DUTY CALL

No Quota To Fill In Jackson Co. For Months Account Of Free-Will Joining.

Jackson county can be thankful for the patriotism of its young men, the county's two local selective service boards believe.

Because so many Jackson county youths have enlisted voluntarily in the army, navy, marine corps or coast guard, no selectees have been sent out of Jackson county since September 14 and there is no quota to fill in the last three months of the year, local headquarters said. Since September 15, credit has been granted local boards for every class 1 or 1-A registrant who enlists in the nation's armed forces.

Of the 80-odd selectees leaving Jackson county since the first quota left here last January 21 about 20 per cent have volunteered for the selective service training, board headquarters said.

129 Volunteer
Sgt. Joseph W. Cushman, commander of the army recruiting station here, said his records show that 72 men have enlisted so far this year. Jack M. Carpenter, chief petty officer in charge of the navy recruiting station, stated that 57 have enlisted in the navy. This is a total of 129 for both services since the first of the year. The number enlisting in the coast guard and marine corps was not immediately obtainable as recruiting officers come here only periodically and maintain no office in Medford.

"We are proud of the patriotic young men we have in Jackson county," said a statement from board headquarters. It was pointed out that a county of comparable population was called upon to supply 130 selectees while in the same period Jackson county had to provide only five because of voluntary enlistments.

Volunteers Choose
The statement from the two boards spoke highly of the recruiting personnel here and pointed out what was described as the value of enlisting in the armed forces rather than waiting for a call as a selectee. Those who enlist, the statement pointed out, can choose, with the experienced advice of the recruiters, the branch of service they are best qualified for and thus place themselves in line to receive specialized training that will qualify them as experts in any of a number of trades and occupations.
