Pickem Selects Huskies, Orange, Cougars, Broncos

Medford Alumni Eleven Noses Out Grants Pass, 13-12

STEAD CONVERTS EXTRA POINT FOR WINNING MARGIN

Locals Score Twice In First Period—Davis Responsible For Pass Tallies.

By the margin of Rodney Stead's line-smash conversion of a point after touchdown, Medford high's alumni eleven defeated the Grants Pass alumni, 13 to 12, in their Thanksgiving day clash at Grants Pass yesterday morning before some 600 customers.

The all-important extra point was made after Medford took the opening kickoff and marched 61 yards into the end zone. Stead, playing left half for the locals, tallied the touchdown on a four-yard blast off his own right tackle; then, added the extra point by going over his own right guard.

Before the first period was over Medford scored again to take a 13 to 0 lead. After a Grants Pass fumble was recovered on the Grants Pass 28, Leo Sakralda tossed a 20-yard forward pass to John Saulsberry, who eluded the safety man and went over for the touchdown.

Burden Scores
With Bill Davis, University of Oregon frosh fullback of this season, leading the assault, the ex-Caymen came back to register their first touchdown a minute before the half ended. Davis broke through for 25 yards, then flung an aerial that Quentin Burden grabbed in the end zone. A pass for the extra point was incomplete.

There was no scoring in the third period, but in the fourth Grants Pass again reached pay dirt, and again it was Davis who did the job. He broke off his own right tackle and raced 62 yards through the Medford secondary for the touchdown. Davis attempted to add the extra point and deadlock the score by going through the line, but Floyd Baker and Art Winetroutr crashed through to smear him for a loss and that was the ball game.

Coaches Coach
Coaches of both teams, Bill Bowerman of Medford and Jim Welch of Grants Pass, had almost the free run of the field. Time after time they walked out with small cards upon which were diagrammed plays, and there was much sideline coaching. None of the "old fellows" were seriously hurt, but Baker of the locals suffered a scratched eyelid.

There is a possibility that a return game will be played in Medford in the near future.

OVERLIN, HOSTAK BATTLE THIS EVE

New York, Nov. 21.—(P)—Ken Overlin of Washington, D. C., and Al Hostak of Seattle, a pair of former middleweight champs, square off tonight at Madison Square Garden to go 10 rounds or less in a light heavyweight scrap.

Since the two fighters no longer are able to get down to the middle-weight poundage, both are eyeing the light-heavyweight crown worn by Gus Lesnevich.

Hostak, formerly regarded as king of the 160-pounders by the N.B.A., will be making his first eastern appearance. His record lists 114 fights, most of which he won by knockouts.

Overlin, a veteran of 12 years in the ring, has had six fights since he lost the middleweight throne to Billy Soose in May and is rated the favorite at odds of about 1 to 0.

HOLLYWOOD BEARS DEFEAT BULLDOGS

Hollywood, Nov. 21.—(P)—The powerful Hollywood Bears copped an easy 17 to 2 victory yesterday over the Los Angeles Bulldogs in a Pacific Coast league professional football game. Attendance was about 15,000.

The triumph resulted largely from two Bulldog fumbles, one in the first period and the other in the third, with Halfback Ken Washington figuring prominently in each instance.

WILSON SCHWENK BREAKS O'BRIEN PASSING RECORD

Washington U. Star Completes 103 Aerials In Year—Many Tilts Saturday.

College football, coming in double doses this week because of the first of the Thanksgiving holidays, got through the appetizers yesterday but the main course comes tomorrow.

Two individual performances yesterday overshadowed anything presented in the way of team achievements on the slim holiday card for the states which called it Turkey day.

At Chapel Hill, N. C., Bullet Bill Dudley slammed the door on a brilliant collegiate career by leading Virginia to a 28-7 victory over North Carolina.

Dudley, backfield ace of the Cavaliers, made his final appearance his best. He scored three touchdowns, two on long runs, passed to the fourth and kicked all four extra points.

The other solo stunt was engineered by Wilson (Bud) Schwenk, the passing star from Washington University at St. Louis, who pitched his team to a 28-7 triumph over Missouri Mines and himself into football's hall of fame.

Schwenk went into the game needing only three completions to break the national record of 93 successful passes in one season, set in 1938 by Davey O'Brien of Texas Christian.

Hits Dozen
The Husky halfback cocked his right arm 23 times, and 12 tosses hit their mark for a total of 106 yards, setting a new record of 103 completions for a single year. Two passes went for tallies and he scored the other two touchdowns himself.

Tomorrow's program may have considerable bearing on the direction the postman travels with post-season bowl bids. Minnesota, which can't play in a bowl because of Big Ten tradition, carries its number-one national ranking into a conference struggle with Wisconsin.

Northwestern engages Illinois in another Big Ten game, while Michigan meets Ohio State and Indiana tangles with Purdue.

Iowa has a non-conference date with Nebraska of the Big Six. Duke stakes its perfect record against North Carolina State in the southern loop and Alabama tries for Southeastern conference honors against Vanderbilt.

Irish vs. Trojans
Heading the intersectional list is the meeting at South Bend between unbeaten but one-tied Notre Dame and Southern California. Fordham takes on St. Mary's at New York, Auburn and Villanova battle at Philadelphia, Georgia entertains Dartmouth and Oklahoma and Marquette get together on the Sooner's field.

On the Pacific coast, Oregon and Washington clash in a conference game. Santa Clara takes on U.C.L.A., Oregon State faces Montana and Washington State engages Gonzaga.

Traditional eastern highlights include meetings of Harvard and Yale, Cornell and Penn. Navy and Princeton, Penn State and Pitt, Colgate and Columbia, Army and West Virginia, Temple and Holy Cross, Lafayette and Lehigh and Boston university and Boston college.

Georgia Tech battles Florida and Tennessee tangles with Kentucky in Southeastern conference games that mean little in the title race.

Texas A. and M. and Texas both rest for next week's important scrap, leaving the

Southwest conference stage to tussles between Texas Christian-Rice, and Baylor-Southern Methodist. Arkansas and Mississippi have a non-conference date.

Missouri goes after a grand slam in the Big Six in its annual shindig with Kansas, while Kansas State tackles Iowa State.

WILLAMETTE WINS GRID TOGA AGAIN

Walla Walla, Nov. 21.—(P)—Exhibiting speed and deception on the ground and in the air, the Willamette Bearcats rolled over a hard fighting but outplayed Whitman college football team yesterday, 28-0, for their second straight Northwest conference football championship.

The Bearcats made 20 first downs to six for the Walla Walla team and scored once each in the first and second periods and twice in the third.

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SON OF MOLOTOV TAKEN BY NAZIS

New York, Nov. 21.—(P)—The German radio reported today that a Russian soldier, identified by competent quarters as the son of Russian Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov had been taken prisoner on the eastern front.

The German broadcast said he was Molotov's son by his first marriage and was known under the name of R. Skrablin.

He was identified as being 22 years old and a student of agriculture before he joined the red army two years ago.

The radio said he was an infantryman and said he told his captors he was "not very fond of a soldier's life."

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
