STRIKES SLOW UP WALL ST. TRADING

New York, Nov. 22. —(P)—Labor shadows continued to cloud recovery tendencies in the stock market today and about the best the list could do at the finish of a fairly successful week was to maintain its balance. Peace in the coal strike was announced long after the close. Steels inclined to slip from the start. Rails held fairly well but were unable to extend their Friday's recovery to any great length. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 40 but on the week showed a net advance of .3. It was the first upturn in this barometer in four weeks. Large blocks of low-priced issues helped put the volume to 364,270 shares, best Saturday aggregate since May 10. It compared with 353,910 a week ago.
