U-BOAT SINKINGS FIGURES SOUGHT

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Three members of the senate's so-called non-interventionist bloc—Senators Wheeler (D-Mont.), Van Nuys (D-Ind.) and Nye (R-N.D.)—called on the navy department today to make public the number of German submarines sunk by American warships.

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) said, however, that "naval experience in both the last war and this one has demonstrated that it is not always desirable to announce the sinking of enemy submarines."

In separate talks with reporters, Wheeler, Van Nuys and Nye declared that the nation should be given all information regarding naval activities which could be released without endangering the lives of American seamen.

MYSTERY FLIGHT WITH SERUM TOLD

New York, Nov. 22.—(AP)—An American Airlines plane carrying 150 cc of poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis) serum was met by a U. S. navy land plane at LaGuardia field early today and the naval plane took off for an undisclosed destination immediately after the serum was turned over to its pilot.

The airlines plane from Chicago landed at 6:15 a. m. (EST) and the serum was transferred immediately. Airline officials at Chicago said the plane had awaited the arrival of the serum there by train from the Columbia hospital in Milwaukee, last night.

The serum had been requested by Leonard Kirby, executive officer of the New York City naval air station, to "send it south," the airline spokesman said.

GUFFEY COAL ACT REPEAL FAVORED

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Senator Connally (D-Tex.) proposed today that congress repeal the Guffey Coal act if CIO miners decline to end the strike which has tied up production in most of the steel companies' captive coal mines and has spread with recurring violence to numerous commercial shafts.

The policy committee of the United Mine Workers assembled here for a forenoon meeting to frame a formal reply to President Roosevelt's most recent peace proposal that the union shop issue which brought on the strike be held in abeyance for the emergency or be submitted to arbitration.

HUGE GAS TAX TAKE

Sacramento, Nov. 22.—(P)—A record of \$60,000,000 will be collected as California gasoline tax this year, state board of equalization officials predicted yesterday.

ARMY MOVES THRU C.I.O. PICKET LINE

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 22.—(P)—United States army trucks moved into the plant of the Atlas Drop Forge Co. today, past scanty picket lines of striking CIO workers, and about 20 soldiers began loading the trucks with completed parts manufactured by the company.

Richard Scott, company president, commented only that "there are some fellows here they want badly."

There were half a dozen trucks in the army force. Officers in charge declined to reveal their destination after loading. Don Falor, a CIO regional official, said the army's move was made with the "fullest cooperation" of the union, which had been notified this particular order of parts was urgently needed. Falor said he understood the parts were intended for tank production at Berwyck, Pa.

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
