NAZIS TO PRESS VICHY FOR BASES IN NORTH AFRICA

New York, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The British offensive in Libya is resulting in intensified German pressure on France for air bases and routes of supply and reinforcement to withstand the drive, sources in Europe informed the Associated Press today.

The upshot may be that the Vichy government of Marshal Petain will be given a formal peace settlement to replace the uneasy armistice which has regulated their relations since June, 1940.

In return, Germany would expect sweeping concessions in North Africa which would be useful in fighting the British drive.

The authorized report from Vichy today that Marshal Petain is going to the German-occupied zone of France soon to meet a "high German personage," perhaps Adolf Hitler, strengthened the opinion of many European observers that formal adherence of the Vichy government to the so-called new order probably will be announced before long.

Warmed-up thug robs benefactor

NAZIS BRIEF ON AFRICAN BATTLE

Berlin, Nov. 22.—(AP)—A German high command communiqué gave one paragraph today to the fighting in North Africa.

"In North Africa, German and Italian troops since Nov. 19 have been engaged in a severe battle on a broad front with strong British tank units," the communiqué said. "The battle continues."

Informed sources said German bombers effectively attacked a railway line and damaged station buildings on the north African battlefield.

Similar raids were reported on British supply dumps, which these sources declared were raked by machine-guns from planes.

Night attacks were made on two southeastern English air bases where hangars were said to have been set afire.

(The British acknowledged that "a few bombs" were dropped in southwest England and Wales, causing little damage and a small number of casualties.)

FILE PROTEST ON ARREST AMERICAN RECTOR IN ROME

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The United States has lodged a strong protest with the Italian government against the arrest and continued detention of the Rev. Hiram Gruber Woolf of Elmira, N. Y., rector of St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal church in Rome.

Secretary Hull instructed George Wadsworth, American charge d'affaires in Rome, to deliver the formal written protest, it was learned today, as soon as the embassy had made a full report of all known circumstances surrounding Mr. Woolf's arrest.

Wadsworth made verbal representations against the clergyman's arrest on Tuesday, soon after Italian police, allegedly under orders from the minister of the interior, had taken him into custody at the rectory of the church.

The embassy was informed at that time that Mr. Woolf had been arrested and was held for investigation "on seriously incriminating information."

Press dispatches from Rome reported he was being held incommunicado on suspicion of intelligence activity, but provided no details.

NORSE EXECUTED

Berlin, Nov. 22.—(AP)—A DNB dispatch from Oslo said today that a Norwegian, Ingvald Garbo, had been executed for circulating "agitating literature" among German soldiers.

ANIMALS FEED ON RECORD CHUM RUN IN COAST RIVERS

Seattle, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Wild animals flocked to coastal streams near here today as the largest run of chum salmon in decades continued up Oregon rivers.

The fish surged upstream in such numbers that hundreds were forced onto the river banks. Seagulls gorged themselves almost to insensibility. Mink and otter joined in the feast.

Fishermen from Tillamook bay to the Alsea river, marketing the once-despised chum at an unexpected 3½ cents a pound, added to a record catch. Already the run has turned a poor season into the most profitable in years.

The chum is at the bottom of the salmon caste. A white-meat fish, averaging 10 pounds in weight, it once was considered too untasty for man. It now is canned and smoked, but until this year the fisherman's profit, if any, was meager.

Fishermen report another benefit. Rats have deserted coastal wharves and can be seen following the salmon upriver for miles. It is feared, however, the rats will return.

Bears, expert fishermen themselves, are getting fat and lazy, since they no longer have to scoop fish from the water. They merely wait on the bank until dinner is forced ashore.

MOLECULE, CAUSE OF FLU, ISOLATED, PHOTOGRAPHED

Philadelphia, Nov. 22.—(AP)—An incredibly small and deadly bullet-shaped molecule, only four-millionths of an inch thick, has been branded as the cause of one of the miseries of mankind, human influenza.

Its isolation and its picture, taken by the new electron microscope, were described today to the American Philosophical society.

Magnified 25,000 diameters until it shows up as a very tiny grey dot on a photograph, the picture is of a deadly specimen taken from the flu infection which killed a person here three years ago. It is moreover the same kind of flu—type A—which spread over the country last winter.

This molecule, a small bit of protein, is one of the tiniest disease agents known to science. One of the most startling things to the layman and of profound significance to medicine about this flu bullet is that it is not a living thing like microbes.

It is able to reproduce itself, when in living tissue, but that seems to be more of a chemical reaction than a sign of actual life.

The discovery has opened a new way to make vaccines against human flu. A new vaccine has already been made which protects animals against human flu, and experiments are now starting to learn whether it will protect man.

The report was made by Doctors Leslie A. Chambers and Werner Henle, of the Eldridge Reeves Johnson Research foundation, University of Pennsylvania. Collaborating in the picture was Dr. T. F. Anderson of R. C. A., makers of the electron microscope.

Washington, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Representative Jones (R-Ohio) said today he had drafted a bill proposing that the 1942 congressional election be held in March instead of November.

A March election, he contended, would afford a desirable early expression by the electorate on President Roosevelt's foreign policies.

Under his proposal, the representatives elected in March would take their seats the following January.

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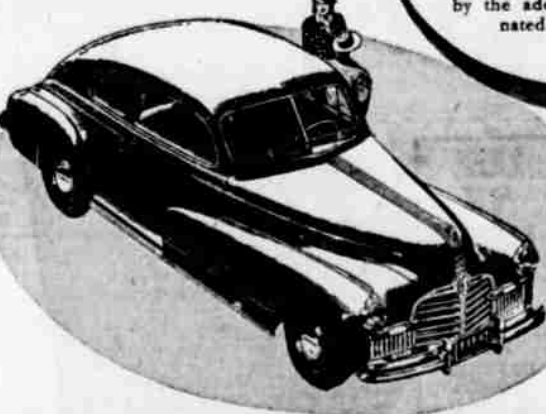
