Tigers Will Be Underdogs When Facing Indians

For the first time this season the Black Tornado will be the distinct and definite underdog when it goes against The Dalles in 1941's windup fracas at The Dalles next Friday night.

Barring the Klamath game, and possibly the Salem affair, the Tigers in all their starts this year have been overwhelming favorites to finish on top. Against Klamath Medford was rated on a par, and against Salem the Tornado was given a slight, but very slight, edge.

But, facing the undefeated and untied Indians, it is a different story, and you can't get away from it. Not with Captain Curt Hopkins positively "out" of the clash with three broken ribs. Not with the game being played in the Redskins' wing. And not in view of that incredibly fine record posted by Chuck McGuinness' eleven.

Yes, Medford will enter this clash, contest the "short-end" so far as the waging strategy are concerned, and it's a logical situation. Whether the lads can rise up and produce an upheaval won't be known until about 10:15 p. m. next Friday, but if they do it WILL be an upheaval and no fooling.

Via a letter to this department comes a bit of praise for the fine sportsmanship shown on the field by this year's Medford club. And it's from a man who should certainly know of what he speaks—an official who worked several Tornado games—but who prefers to have his name unmentioned because, officials are supposed to be utterly impersonal toward all teams. An excerpt of the letter follows:

"... I want to write a word or two about what good sports the Medford team has been, particularly the past year. Strictly gentlemen from the time they started until the finish, so far as any of the officials were concerned. All of the southern Oregon schools consider Medford their most hated foe, and they really go out for blood when they play."

"Consequently, there might be room for a little squawking from the Medford team. But that surely hasn't been the case this year. Not a word of abuse to any of the opposing players or officials. The same goes for Bowerman. Bill knows the rules pretty well and seldom, if ever, is there any misunderstanding between him and the officials."

And, we might add, the writer of the above does NOT live in Medford, and never has.

VICTORY FOR OSC WILL RESULT IN BID TO PASADENA

Win For Oregon Will Develop Chaotic Situation—Cougars Still In Running.

San Francisco, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Pigskin preview: Pacific coast conference football is expected to write the most momentous chapter of the 1941 season this week-end.

The Rose Bowl team may be decided on the outcome of one game. If Oregon State college defeats University of Oregon, belief prevails generally it will be named to represent the conference in the New Year's day gridiron spectacle at Pasadena. If it fails in this crucial test the word picture will be "chaos."

Defeat for Oregon State and victory the same day for Stanford over California would put the defending championship Stanford team in strategic position to leap back into the Rose Bowl. It would hold the most favorable record, five wins and only two defeats, Oregon State, because it is the only eleven that plays both of the somewhat orphaned conference members, Idaho and Montana, now enjoys a standing of six victories and two losses.

Up To Beavers

Should Oregon State lose and Stanford win, however, the latter's Rose Bowl qualifications will be contested by Washington State college. Supporters of W. S. C. will beat the ballyhoo drums with arguments their team whipped Oregon, Oregon State and Stanford and apparently was the strongest in the conference windup, despite three defeats.

The solution to this possible muddle, therefore, probably lies with Oregon State. Will it slide by its old and most bitter rival Oregon, Saturday? The answer will be written on the turf at Eugene.

Oregon will enjoy whatever advantage goes with playing on its home field. Tex Oliver's team is as big and tough as Lon Stiner's Oregon State. Of the two backfields, Oregon's half-back combination of Mecham and Roblin is the equal if not superior to Oregon State's clever duo, Durand and Dethman. The difference may be between the lines and game for game, Oregon State has the margin here.

Stiner's sturdies have yielded but 26 points in eight games Oregon 82 in seven so defensive lusty must be given the call.

Indians Play Cal

Stanford rested last week, preparing for its big game with California, Saturday at Palo Alto. So did California.

Washington plays Southern California at Los Angeles in the only other conference clash. The northern team was a red hot favorite to win this game until the Trojans turned in their inspired 20-18 losing effort against Notre Dame last week. Southern California now will be at least an even choice.

A crowd of 20,000 saw Moffett field chalk up its fourth straight victory against service competition. The flyers have lost only to St. Mary's college this season.

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The Dalles, Newport Stay Unbeaten in Prep Circles

The Dalles and Newport defended unbeaten records in Oregon high school football play last week and headed for title-making games this week.

The Dalles meets the powerful Medford Black Tornado and Newport is negotiating with Amity for a post-season game that would decide the state class B title.

If Medford bowls over The Dalles, the mythical class A state championship would go by default to undefeated Myrtle Point. A win by the Indians would leave the issue in confusion, since Myrtle Point has stowed its moleskins away for the year, announcing it would not play in a post-season game for the title.

Medford rested for the game, but The Dalles warmed up by trouncing Pendleton, eastern Oregon's second strongest team, 40 to 0, the largest score compiled by the Indians this season.

In B play Amity chalked up its ninth and tenth wins of the season by measuring Dayton, 33 to 7, and Arlington, 13 to 12. Arlington, eastern Oregon's leading B team, then met Newport and fell, 39 to 13. It was Newport's ninth victory of the year, and paved the way for an Amity-Newport clash.

Albany earned a tie with Corvallis and Salem for the No. 1 name league lead by downing Eugene, 7 to 0. Corvallis crushed the Pacific University freshmen, 27 to 0, while Salem lost to Everett, Wash., 28 to 0. Ashland trimmed Roseburg, 32 to 7, and Milton-Freewater trounced Dayton, Wash., by the same score.

Pro Giants Trounce Redskins, 20-13, to Win Eastern Title

Chicago, Nov. 24.—(AP)—The Chicago Bears and Green Bay Packers apparently are headed straight for a deadlock for the western division title in the National football league—and that would mean a payoff playoff with lots of jingles in the cash register but headaches for the coaches of the teams concerned.

The fact that the New York Giants have clinched the eastern crown—they did it yesterday by heating Washington, 20-13—brings home the reminder that it's nearly time for the inter-division championship battle.

If the Packers ease past Washington next Sunday, and if the Bears outscore Philadelphia this week and the Chicago Cardinals on Dec. 7, they will tie for western sectional honors and will have to meet for a third time this season on Dec. 14, the date tentatively set for the titular showdown between the champs of east and west.

The Packers right now are sharp for that championship game. They showed it yesterday by mowing down the Pittsburgh Steelers, 54-7, setting a new scoring high for the season.

The Bears, too, proved their readiness for championship competition by whipping the Detroit Lions yesterday, 24-7.

The Chicago Cardinals tuned up for their concluding games against Detroit and the Bears by defeating Cleveland's last-place Rams, 7-0. Brooklyn and Philadelphia were idle.

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ARMY-NAVY CLASH HIGHLIGHTS GRID SLATE THIS WEEK

Gophers Retain Big Ten Title—Duke Cinches Tie For Southern Loop Crown

New York, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Except for the Army-Navy clash at Philadelphia Saturday and some widely spaced games here and there not much is left of the football season except allocating the various teams to the equally various bowls.

Of the four unbeaten powers, Minnesota isn't interested in a Big Ten ruling because of a bowl invitation. Except for that the Gophers, who haven't lost since late in 1939, probably could designate their own January 1 dwelling place.

Texas A. & M. still has two major opponents to play although it clinched the Southwest conference flag Saturday when Texas Christian, its only remaining rival, was tied. Duke and Duquesne, their schedules completed, are sitting about in nervous expectation.

Here's how the various conferences shape up with only one big weekend left in the season:

Big Ten: Minnesota retained its title by submerging Wisconsin, 41 to 6, for its seventeenth triumph in a row. Michigan and Ohio State, participants in Saturday's 20 to 20 thriller, likewise tied for second. Fourth place went to Northwestern, which closed Bob Zuppke's career as coach of the Illini with a 27 to 0 setback. By conference rule the season ends the Saturday before the last Thursday in November and the teams are forbidden to compete in post-season games.

Southeastern Scrambled
Southeastern: Mississippi and Mississippi State will do much to clarify the picture in their meeting at Oxford Saturday. Ole Miss trimmed Arkansas Saturday while the Staters walloped little Millsaps, 49 to 6, in warmups for the big game. Missouri Valley: Tulsa retained the conference title by drubbing Drake, 20 to 6.

Klamath Falls, Nov. 24.—(AP)—H. Brown of North Bend took the lead in the men's open singles yesterday as the Oregon Bowling congress entered its second day.

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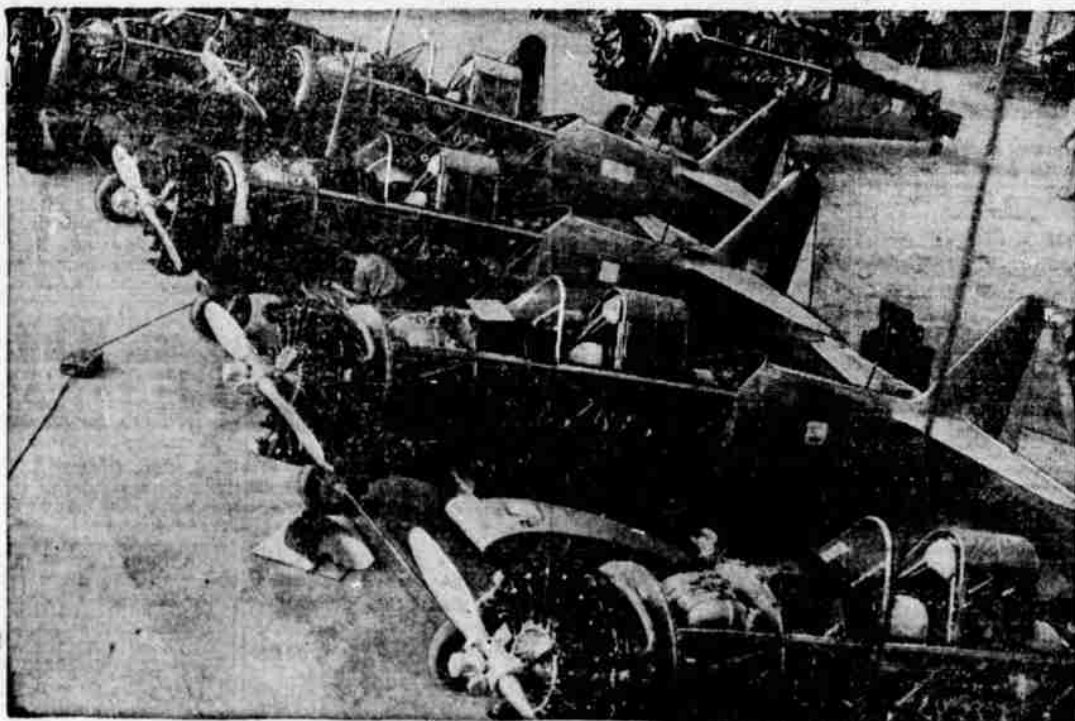
