

TWO WOMEN HURT WHEN CARS CRASH AT FOURTH, GRAPE

Mrs. Charles McKee and Mrs. Fred Lumm Seriously Injured.

Two women were in Community hospital today with injuries suffered when cars, operated by their husbands, collided at the corner of Fourth and Grape streets about 10 a.m. Sunday.

Mrs. Charles McKee, 55, of Route 1, sustained the most extensive injuries. She was receiving treatment for a scalp laceration, a fractured right arm, a fractured left knee cap, a laceration of the tongue and multiple bruises, according to her attending physician.

Mrs. Fred Lumm, of 1222 West Main street, knocked unconscious momentarily, suffered bruises and shock, her doctor stated.

Mr. McKee sustained a lacerated nose and Mr. Lumm suffered a laceration of the face. Neither was hospitalized.

According to a police report of the mishap, the car being driven east on Fourth street by Mr. Lumm was struck on the right side by the machine being operated north on Grape street by Mr. McKee. Following the impact the Lumm auto was shoved up onto the sidewalk on the northeast corner. Both cars were considerably damaged.

TURKEY GROWERS HOLDING FOR MORE

Local produce houses reported today that turkey growers are holding out for 30 cents per pound for No. 1 hens, and 25 cents per pound for No. 1 toms and as a result the local shipments lag, though time is short to dispatch them east for the Christmas trade. Swift and Company reported their Thanksgiving price is 27 cents per pound for No. 1 hens, and 22½ cents for No. 1 toms. This was the last local quotation.

It is estimated that less than half of the valley turkey crop was shipped out during the Thanksgiving season. The total output was figured at close to 45,000 birds.

Swift and Company reported they expected to start buying and killing Wednesday or Thursday of this week.

BELLE VAIL PAINE CALLED BY DEATH

Belle Vail Paine died at her home, North Orange street, Medford, Sunday afternoon, November 23.

Born at Unionville, N. Y., she was married to Lieutenant William H. Paine, United States army, in New York City, June 1, 1897. Then followed twenty-three years of army life during which she made homes in Colorado, Georgia, Kansas, California, Vermont, Cuba and three times in the Philippine Islands. She had lived in Medford since 1921.

Except her husband she leaves no relatives in Oregon.

Funeral services will be private.

AUTO CRASH SUIT IN COURT TUESDAY

The regular circuit court jury, including a special venire of five names drawn last week, to bring the total of 24, has been directed by the court to appear tomorrow for the damage suit of Waldo Green against H. N. Adams of Puyallup, Wash.

Green seeks \$20,000 general damages and \$1,000 special damages for personal injuries allegedly received in an accident on the Pacific highway in the Siskiyou in July 1940.

It is anticipated the trial will last two or three days. Attorneys Don R. Newbury and Charles W. Reames are opposing counsel.

BAN TIN FOIL USE AFTER MARCH 15

Washington, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Start saying goodbye to the lead foil on a package of tobacco, the tin foil on a bottle of ginger ale.

Effective March 15, they'll be forbidden in the interests of defense.

OPM issued the order yesterday, and it bans the use of tin or lead foil in the packaging of tobacco products, chewing gum, candy, beverages, typewriter ribbons, films and friction tape.

Foil manufacturers, OPM explained, were using about 6,500 tons of lead each month. The metal is widely needed for defense purposes, and only part of the required supply is produced in this country.

CHILDREN IN FIRE
Nome, Alaska, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Several children received burns when fire destroyed the Eskimo industrial boarding school at White Mountain yesterday. No details of the fire are yet available. The children who were injured are being brought to Nome by airplane.

1 KILLED, 80 HURT IN TRAIN WRECK

Corinth, Miss., Nov. 24.—(AP)—One passenger was killed and more than 80 injured, three so seriously they may die, when eight cars of the Illinois Central's fast passenger train, the Seminole, left the tracks and hurtled down a 30-foot embankment a mile south of there yesterday.

Mrs. Dovie Robertson, 72, of Selmer, Tenn., died in a hospital here two and a half hours after the accident. Listed as critically injured were Mrs. J. W. Garman of Chicago; James Madison Spurlock of Eufaula, Ala., and Mrs. J. T. Evans, 67, of Jackson, Tenn. The fast train, bound from Florida to Chicago, was loaded with persons returning from Thanksgiving visits with relatives and friends. A transverse fissure in a rail was described by railroad officials as the cause of the wreck.

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YANKEE GUNBOATS LEAVING YANGTZE

Shanghai, Nov. 24.—(AP)—The United States gunboat Wake left Hankow for Shanghai today, beginning the withdrawal of the American navy's Yangtze river patrol between Shanghai and Hankow.

The 370-ton Wake was the last accidental guardship left at Hankow. United States naval authorities there also closed their warehouse and liquidated the stocks.

About 50 Americans—35 of them missionaries—remained in Hankow.

Evacuation of United States naval forces at Shanghai, including marines, appeared tonight to be near execution following upon President Roosevelt's order earlier this month to the marines to retire from China. The marines are expected to be out of Shanghai by Sunday. Withdrawal of the naval patrol appeared likely to be effected the last of the week.

Ice Cream Plant Is Damaged by Blaze

Portland, Nov. 24.—(AP)—A three-alarm fire caused \$200,000 damage at the Sunfreeze ice cream plant here yesterday.

Manager Gustave E. Hilen, who estimated the damage, said later surveys might show the \$1,000,000 structure, owned by the Arden Farms Dairy, to have suffered even greater loss.

Two firemen were slightly injured in controlling the blaze, cause of which was undetermined.

STOP SIGNS FOR FOURTH STREET UP IN FEW DAYS

Installation of stop signs and buttons along Fourth street and Central avenue will be started tomorrow, Fred W. Scheffel, city superintendent stated today.

The city council approved this traffic safety move September 16 but giving effect to the council's action has been delayed by slowness in delivery of the necessary signs. Mr. Scheffel explained. The signs, of a kind that can be seen at night, had to be ordered in the east, he related, adding that they are now on hand and were being attached to steel posts today. The buttons, in accordance with state regulations, will be imbedded in the center of the streets at the entrance to Fourth street and Central avenue. The signs will go in the parkways.

While delivery of the signs has been awaited, accidents have continued to occur along Fourth street. The latest, occurring yesterday morning at Fourth and Grape streets caused injury to four persons, all of whom were taken to a hospital for treatment, two of them in an ambulance.

Under the resolution adopted by the council, Fourth street was made a stop street from North Oakdale avenue to Riverside avenue, excepting Central avenue. Central avenue was made a stop street from Sixth street to Edwards street. The Fourth street action was solely for traffic safety while the Central avenue move was a preparatory step governing a smooth flow of traffic in case the proposed Medford army cantonment should become a reality.
