ALLEY STABBING PUTS ONE IN JAIL ONE IN HOSPITAL

One man was in a local hospital today with four knife wounds in the chest and another was being held on an open charge while city police further investigated a stabbing affray which occurred about 5 p. m. yesterday in an alley at the rear of Otto's club, 39 South Front street.

Hospitalized with the knife wounds, one of which penetrated his left lung, was Alphonse William Finley, 33, of the Allen hotel, a cook by trade. His attending physician reported the man was in considerable pain today, but that the wounds were not expected to prove critical.

Held in city jail and accused by Finley of stabbing him, was Dennis D. Dulworth, 28, an orchard worker who lives in a shack just north of McAndrews road.

Police questioned Dulworth this morning, obtaining his side of the story, and planned to interrogate Finley in the hospital this afternoon.

Dulworth was quoted by police as saying that Finley insulted him while the pair were in Otto's club and that he invited Finley outside to fight. When they reached the alley, according to Dulworth's story to police, Finley drew a pocket knife and slashed Dulworth's left wrist.

Dulworth told police he then took the knife away from Finley and "made several passes at him" with the knife. Later, a friend took Dulworth to a local doctor where his cut wrist was treated. Dulworth admitted to police that he had been drinking considerably, and did not remember anything from the time he was in the doctor's office until he awakened in jail this morning. He was arrested last night at his home.

The first police knew of the stabbing affray was when Finley walked into the police station at 5:30 and reported that he had four knife wounds in the chest. At that time he told police he had been stabbed by Dulworth.

Anti-Comintern Pact Renewed in Ceremony in Reich Chancellory

Berlin, Nov. 25.—(P)—The anti-comintern pact sponsored by Germany was renewed for five years and broadened to include 13 signatories today in a festive ceremony at which a Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop declared that the western democracies had become "assistants to world communism."

Concluding the ceremonies in the chancellory where the pact was hailed as a demonstration of continental solidarity against Moscow, London and Washington, Ribbentrop declared the signatories "will never rest" until the destruction of world communism.

President Lincoln made the first of the presidential proclamations under which Thanksgiving has been celebrated annually since as a national holiday.

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 25.—(P)—President Pedro Aguirre Cerda of Chile, who had headed South America's first and only popular front government, died today.

He had turned over powers of the presidency temporarily to Gerontimo Mendez, leader of the radical party, on November 10 because of failing health.
