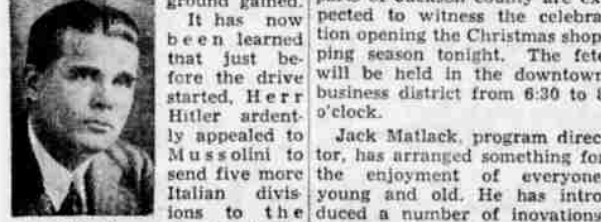

fuhrer told Duce about the Russian front was considerably less confident than the tone of the recent Berlin announcements. Hitler used every pressure on his Italian so-called ally.

But Mussolini's generals had the audacity to turn the nazis down. They said they feared attack on the Libyan front and an ensuing grave threat to the Italian mainland itself. As a result, all the active military help Hitler is going to get out of Italy this winter is the three token divisions already fighting (more or less) on the Red battleline.

Another revealing account of inner axis troubles has reached authorities here. The British seized considerably more than 100,000,000 lire from their conquest of Ethiopia and the Wavell invasion of Libya. The Italian currency was in banking and commerce of the two Italian colonies. The British thought the seized currency could best be used by selling it piecemeal on the black bourse of Switzerland. That was done, but practically all of it was secretly bought—not by Mussolini or the Swiss—but by the "ally" of Italy, Her Hitler himself.

BRITISH CIRCLED SOUTH OF REZEGH AND ANNIHILATED

Over 5,000 Prisoners Taken Is Assertion—Russians Admit German Gains.

Axis front-line dispatches declared today that British troops south of Rezegh, scene of a three-day battle of massed tanks, had been encircled and "annihilated" with more than 5,000 prisoners captured, and German military quarters asserted flatly that the Libyan desert campaign could no longer be regarded as a British offensive.

Big Battle Looms

British middle east headquarters said the Germans had rushed up reinforcements to Rezegh and that a big battle was expected there momentarily. A Cairo bulletin reported that the British Tobruk garrison had smashed deeper into axis siege lines and declared that strong British tank reinforcements, previously held in reserve, were now moving into the forward battle zones to bolster other imperial armored columns which had been reorganizing for a new attack in the Rezegh area.

Admit Nazi Gains

On the Russo-German war front, the Russians admitted serious new German gains on the northern and southern flanks of Moscow's defense arc, but declared that Red army counter-attacks in the Ukraine had thrown the nazis back six more miles northeast of Rostov-on-Don, in the sector where the Germans had already lost from 37 to 60 miles.

The Vichy (French) radio, quoting "German front" reports, said nazis mechanized forces had slashed through Red army defenses to a point within less than 16 miles of Moscow—the closest approach to the Soviet capital since Adolf Hitler started his huge-scale drive against Moscow on October 2.

Report Unconfirmed

There was no confirmation of the report elsewhere, however. S. A. Lovzsky, official Soviet spokesman, said that German casualties in the fighting around Rostov totaled 37,000 and that the two major drives against Moscow had cost the nazis more dead and wounded than the 330,000 they lost in the world war Battle of Verdun.

MILITARY HONORS TENDERED WHITE

Portland, Ore., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. George A. White, commander of the 41st division, was buried with military honors today.

An artillery caisson carried the casket through downtown streets. It was escorted by 2500 soldiers from the 41st division who paused at an intersection and presented arms while the general's body slowly passed by. Master Sgt. Fred W. Schlingman, senior non-commissioned officer of the division, carried the general's two-star flag as the funeral cortege proceeded from Trinity Episcopal church to Riverview cemetery for burial in the family plot.
Oregon American Legion posts will drape department and post colors with the official badge of mourning for 30 days in honor of the general. White, who died Sunday, was one of the founders of the Legion.

War Bulletins

New York, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini may leave Rome for the Libyan front to encourage his Italian soldiers, the Rome radio said today in a broadcast heard by NBC.

Berlin, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The German air force bombed harbors and airdromes in south-east and southwest England by day and by night, a German communique said today. Heavy calibre bombs were used. In a successful defense of a convoy against attack by British motor torpedo boats, the communique said, a German patrol boat was sunk by a torpedo but the crew was saved.

Berlin, Nov. 26.—(AP)—German shock troops were declared today to have made "considerable progress" on the Moscow front where a spokesman said fighting now was raging in the "inner defense lines" of the Soviet capital.

EIGHT BILLIONS GIVEN APPROVAL FOR DEFENSE USE

Washington, Nov. 26.—(AP)—A house appropriations subcommittee gave approval today to another huge defense supply bill—totaling close to \$8,000,000,000—more than three-fourths of which would go to the army for ordnance, aircraft, construction at military posts, and other items.

The subcommittee was reported to have modified an administration proposal that it be given complete leeway in transferring military equipment, appropriated for since March 11, to foreign nations.

Committee members said the funds in the pending bill were divided in such a way as to give the house an opportunity to decide how much could be used for lend-lease purposes.

Hull and Jap Envoys Resume Discussions In Search for Peace

Washington, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The Japanese-American discussions which have lagged since last Saturday are being resumed today at the state department.

Secretary of State Hull arranged to meet with Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura, the Japanese ambassador, and Saburo Kuroki, a special envoy, at 1:45 p. m. PST.

Hull conferred at the White House with President Roosevelt just before the announcement was made.

Hull refused at his press conference today to discuss phases of Japanese-American relations.

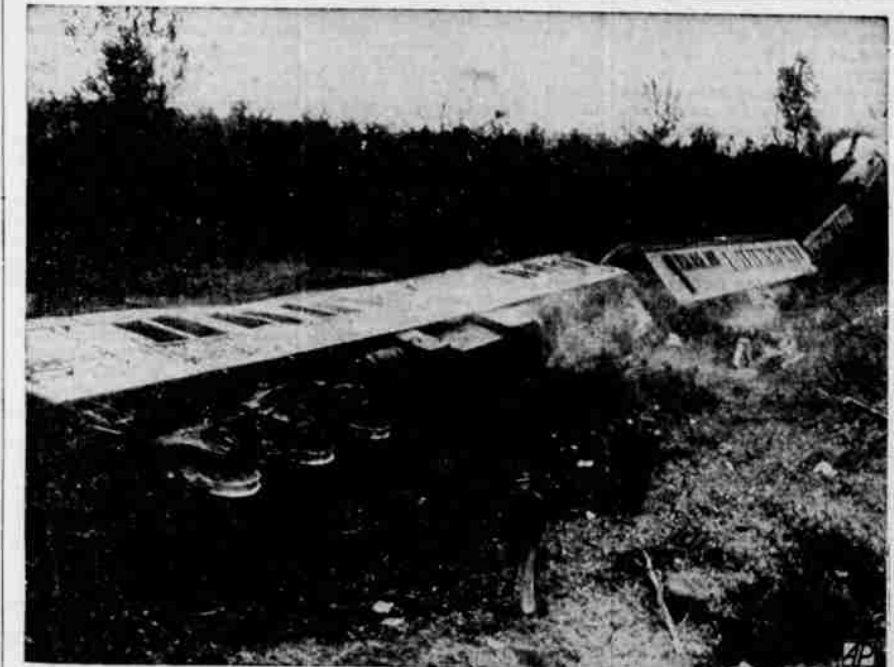

Paris Fined For Nazi Cafe Blast

Paris, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The city of Paris was fined 1,000,000 francs (about \$20,000) by the German authorities today as the result of a bomb explosion in a Nazi restaurant. The restaurant, which the Germans said was bombed by terrorists, was one German authority had taken over for their use.

Administration Wins First Skirmish in Price Control

Washington, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The house refused today to substitute over-all price control legislation, which would regulate wages as well as commodity prices, for the selective type of control advocated by the administration.

Rejection of the substitute, proposed by Rep. Gore (D-Tenn.) furnished the first test of house sentiment on the price-control issue but the administration bill still had several formidable hurdles ahead of it.

The teller vote on rejection of the substitute was announced as 218 to 63.

There were demands heard for sending the entire subject back to committee for further study.

EASIER REMOVAL URGED FOR JUDGES

Washington, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Associate Justice Robert H. Jackson told senators today that several federal judges should have been removed from office for misbehavior when he was attorney general but it was not regarded as feasible or possible to bring impeachment proceedings against them.

In an unusual appearance before a senate judiciary subcommittee, the supreme court justice urged passage of a house-approved bill that would facilitate removal of federal district and circuit court judges.

Both Justice Jackson and Attorney General Francis Biddle, who followed him as a witness, cited the case of Federal Circuit Judge J. Warren Davis, who resigned recently after twice being tried for conspiracy.

County Gets \$35,788 In Lieu of O-C Taxes

The county treasurer's office has received from the government a check for \$35,788.84 for the 1936 claim of Jackson county in lieu of taxes on Oregon-California grant lands. The money is from the 25 per cent fund. The money has been turned over to the assessor's office for apportionment among county funds in the 1942 half-year taxes.

No Bowl Game For Notre Dame Team

South Bend, Ind., Nov. 26.—(AP)—The Rev. John J. Cavanagh, vice president of the University of Notre Dame and chairman of the athletic board, announced today the "Fighting Irish" would not engage in a post-season football game.

COOL-OFF PERIOD FINDING FAVOR AS CURB ON STRIKES

House Labor Committee Studies Tentative Draft—Restriction Is Opposed.

A tentative draft of legislation to require cooling off periods before strikes could be carried out in defense industries, including a provision for compulsory arbitration, was studied by the house labor committee today.

Acting Chairman Ramspeck (D-Ga.) drew the legislation by direction of the committee after attending an extraordinary conference by Democrats and Republicans of the house with President Roosevelt and federal labor officials.

Under the measure, during the so-called cooling off periods, conciliation, mediation, and as a last resort, compulsory arbitration ordered by the president, would be attempted.

James B. Carey, CIO secretary, was reported to have urged the committee, meeting behind closed doors, not to recommend any restrictive legislation. He suggested that management and labor meet with the president to discuss a set of mutually accepted principles to govern labor relations during the emergency.

While congress continued work on proposed legislation, negotiations looking toward a settlement of the paralyzing general strike by 8,500 AFL machinists in the St. Louis area were deadlocked. Three AFL unions—machinists, hoisting engineers and carpenters—refused to recede from their positions which caused the jurisdictional walkout over the right to represent 24 garage mechanics.

The strike was described by an OPM labor expert as "the most important and serious labor tie-up anywhere in the nation."

FANS MAY RIDE IN SPECIAL PULLMAN

A committee of local fans who plan to attend the Oregon-Oregon State game at Eugene Saturday is securing reservations for a special sleeper car via the Southern Pacific to that city. A special round trip rate will also be available if sufficient reservations are secured to take care of the special car. Ashland and Grants Pass residents are eligible for the special rate.

The Pullman will be put on a siding at Eugene after arrival Friday night and will be picked up by the regular Southbound train from Portland Saturday night. Word has been received from Eugene that no hotel accommodations are available for the week end.

The special Pullman will leave here Friday at 7:50 p. m. and fans wishing reservations are urged to phone the Southern Pacific their reservations early Thursday.
