Billy Hulen Says:

Tigers To Lose
Eight 1941 Regs
Via Graduation

Whoever happens to be coaching the Black Tornado next year, be it Bill Bowerman still awaiting that call to active service or some other football teacher, it's a cinch he will be faced with a considerable rebuilding job.

Graduation will take a horrible swipe at Tiger ranks, and when the boys get through receiving their diplomas only three of this season's regulars will be on hand for duty next autumn.

Those three are Cliff Jones, fullback; Bud Mayfield, big left tackle and Stan Smith, the right tackle. All are juniors this year so have one more year of competition remaining.

Slated to be graduated are both regular ends, Captain Curt Hopkins and Bill Wall; both guards, Wes Davis and Bob Mitchell; the first string center, Dan Winter; the great little blocking quarterback, Bob Stead, and both halfbacks, Pass-Pitching Cato Wray and Ike Orr.

Other squad members who will walk the graduation plank are Jimmy Glenn, who saw plenty of service at both guard and fullback; Ivan Cherry, left tackle; Jack Pope, center; Lee Reynolds, right end.

The 1942 situation might not be so gloomy as it appears at first glance, however, because a flock of second and third stringers, who received plenty of experience this season, will return for more gridironing.

Among them are Chet Ricks and Gil Tunny, left ends; Ken Stocks, Ivan Cherry and Don Barrow, left tackles; Clay Anderson and Fred Ruch, left guards; Bill Bayliss and Jim Miller, centers; Roger Barker and Jim Hoey, right guards; Ray Casebeer and Leo Miksche, right tackles; Bob Young and Darrell Montieth, left ends; Bob Davis and Jack Baker, quarterbacks; Steve Dippel, Jack Young, Pete

Orr and Hal Adams, halfbacks and Steve Isaac, fullback. In addition, the Tornado may draw an ace or two from this year's junior high eleven, although the latter team was slightly below its usual form.

Bob Leonard, the red-headed sports editor of the Klamath Falls News and Herald, was in town the other day to look over the Medford Ice Arena, and he brought word of a Buck Hammer suggestion that we heartily endorse.

The Klamath Falls coach is of the opinion that the annual Medford-Klamath classic, instead of being played so early in the season, should be installed as a yearly Armistice Day affair, with the games alternating between the two towns.

With all due respect to Ashland and Grants Pass, the fact remains that nine years out of ten the Medford-Klamath game is the Southern Oregon conference's "big" contest, the contest to determine the championship.

With this an established fact, it stands to reason that the game should be the final one of the loop schedule, instead of coming in the middle of both teams' slate like it did this year, on October 17.

Besides that, it would give Medford a big Armistice Day clash every other year, against a team that couldn't be duplicated for drawing power and interest anywhere in the state. We are all for it, Mr. Hammer.

Football Briefs

Palo Alto, Calif., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Stanford, not strictly by choice, may rely on a backfield essentially of the power type in its vital game against California Saturday.

Noted primarily for their speed, the Indians are expected to call heavily on Bob Crane, Bill Sheller and Buck Fawcett to line up with Quarterback Frankie Albert. Of the three, only Fawcett is notably fast.

Coach Clark Shaughnessy remarked that Stanford has been none too successful at the four-year-at-a-time game to which the heavy backfield is best adapted.

He said, however, that there seemed no alternative inasmuch as injuries to Eric Armstrong, Pete Kmetovic and Milt Vucinich—Albert's usual mates—have made their availability uncertain.

Berkeley, Calif., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Only Left Tackle Bob Reinhard and Center Brunel Christensen, of California's linemen, today appeared certain of starting against Stanford in the football game the Bears want most of all to win.

Coach Leonard B. Allison said he had been unable to decide on the nominees for their other five berths in the forward wall because there were at least two candidates of equal ability for each position.

The No. 1 backfield already has been chosen. It is composed of Al Derian, left half, John Graves, right half, Jack McQuary, fullback and Joe Mello, quarterback.

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BAND, STUDENTS WILL GATHER FOR ROUSING SENDOFF

24-Man Squad In Good Shape For Final Game—To See Ducks, Beavers.

A gigantic student body rally, with the band blaring and cheers rending the night air, will provide a thunderous sendoff for Medford high's Black Tornado football squad as it boards the northbound Southern Pacific passenger train tonight for The Dalles, where Friday night at 8 o'clock it goes against the unbeaten and untied Indians in the final game of the 1941 season.

The rally will get under way at 7:30 sharp at the railroad station, and for 20 minutes the students will roar encouragement to the once-defeated Tornado to upset The Dalles and end their campaign in the well-known blaze of glory. The train leaves at 7:50.

The Tiger squad, 24 strong in addition to Coach Bill Bowerman, Assistant Coaches Russ Acheson and Ed Kirtley, and one student manager, will arrive in The Dalles about noon Thursday, and will hold a light workout on Amotian field in the afternoon. Saturday morning at 4:10 the squad will entrain for Eugene, where it will attend the Oregon-Oregon State game, and will return to Medford at 7:35 a. m. Sunday by train from Eugene.

Jones Eligible

Bowerman said all the players were in good condition for the clash with the lone exception of Quarterback Bob Stead and Center Dan Winter, both of whom have rather bad bruises. They'll start the battle, however. Fullback Cliff Jones, whose grades prevented him from playing against Salem, is eligible again and will be at his regular post.

Other starters will find Darrell Montieth and Bill Wall at the ends, Stan Smith and Bud Mayfield at the tackles, Wes Davis and Bob Mitchell at the guards, Cato Wray and Ike Orr at the halfbacks.

Also making the trip will be Bill Bayliss, center; Jimmy Glenn, Roger Barker and Clay Anderson, guards; Ray Casebeer and Ken Stocks, tackles; Bob Young and Lee Reynolds, ends; Jack Baker, quarterback; Steve Isaac, fullback, and Hal Adams, Jack Young and Steve Dippel, halfbacks.

Coach Bowerman was noncommittal today over the Tornado's chances to tip over the last major undefeated and untied Oregon prep eleven, saying only that "the boys will do their best."

Officials for the game were expected to be Chappie King, George Minnaugh and either Pete Miller or Doug Lowell, all of Portland.

AMATEUR TENNIS 'STINKS', CLAIMS FRANKIE KOVACS

'No Money In It Any More,' Charges Indoor Champ—Suspended By USLTA.

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 26.—(AP)—"Amateur tennis stinks—there's no money in it any more,"

Clowning Frankie Kovacs, one of the country's top-ranking tennis players, was talking, perturbed not little over the U. S. Lawn Tennis association's ruling suspending him for alleged violation of amateur regulations.

"They can't do this to me," chided the lanky Oakland kid who puts in a daily stint at a nearby shipyard.

"Did I take money? My answer is 'Who hasn't?'" "Did I violate a rule? Yes, rule No. 38, but tell them I haven't made a foot fault in years."

May Turn Pro While rumors circulated that Kovacs, along with national singles champion Bobby Riggs, was on the verge of turning professional, the No. 2 star of the nation took a crack at the U.S.L.T.A., with which he has been feuding for years.

"The old fossils sit around a big heaping table of food, using up some of the money I make them, and they say, 'Let's see, who can we bar now?'" Kovacs said in an interview.

"That fellow Kovacs," somebody says, and I'm it." "They've been doing this to me for years. They always bar me when there are no tournaments."

"I'm their No. 2 attraction, and I have to work for a living. Amateur tennis stinks—there's no money in it any more."

BEAVER, WEBFOOT COACHES BEMOAN PLAYER INJURIES

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Oregon State college girded this week to defend a prior claim to a Rose Bowl bid against a University of Oregon team that is in a steaming stretch drive.

The old rivals play Saturday at Eugene, home of the University eleven which—after losing its third game—bounced back lustily, defeating powerful Santa Clara and knocking Washington out of Rose Bowl contention.

At present OSC and Stanford are the pace-setters in this close race of Pacific coast conference teams. Each has lost twice. The Beavers' edge lies in their 10-0 victory over Stanford last month.

Although Coach Lon Stiner's eleven walloped Idaho, UCLA, California and Montana in its last four games it was no better than an even choice. Coach Jim Phelan, beaten by both Oregon teams, said last Saturday after Oregon trimmed his Washington Huskies 19-16, "that team has the finest material I have seen on any coast squad this season—how did they ever lose a game?"

Webfoot Coach Tex Oliver, whose imaginative offense has made his team a western favorite, was noncommittal, saying only that he had a badly banged up ball club, that three linemen—end Bill Regner, center Elliott Wilson and guard Ray Segale—might not play and that his halfback virtuoso, Curt Meacham, certainly would be under par.
