THERE are interesting hints in the news today (Tuesday)—and not much else.

THE heavy fighting in Libya appears to be taking place about 10 miles south of Tobruk. British front line dispatches say the Germans are being gradually cut off from their supplies by the British column advancing along the Mediterranean coast line.

Cairo says the three-day tank battle is beginning to die down as a result of heavy losses on both sides. British infantry reinforcements are said to be pouring into the area.

Cairo claims the German tank forces are badly crippled and says there are NO SIGNS OF FRESH GERMAN TROOPS being sent into action.

WATCH this point. It's all-important.

If Hitler is unable to reinforce his Germans in Africa and has to stand by and see them wiped out, it will be the FIRST time such a thing has happened.

It would be an almost certain

sign that he has his hands completely full.

THERE'S another interesting hint in today's news.

Monday's dispatches told of tremendously increased German pressure on Moscow, carrying the Nazi advance to within 30 odd miles of the Soviet capital.

Today the Russians claim an advance of SIXTY MILES in a counter-attack westward from Rostov, at the far southern end of the long battle line.

THAT might mean that in order to bolster their attack on Moscow the Germans had to weaken their lines before Rostov.

This (if true) would be another sign that Hitler is running short of reserves.

WHATEVER you do, DON'T jump to the conclusion that Hitler has shot his bolt and is losing his striking power. That would be wishful thinking of the sappiest sort.

But at least these SEEMING failures to be there "fustest with the mostest men" are interesting.

THERE are hints from Washington today that sending U. S. troops to Dutch Guiana is intended to head off something that might happen in French Guiana.

Your map will show you that Dutch and French Guiana lie side by side at the northeast corner of South America. There have been plenty of hints that Vichy France may throw in with Hitler.

Hitler, of course, would like

nothing better than to start something in South America.

ON the home front, this dispatch comes from Washington:

"President Roosevelt told congress to start writing its own ticket today on strike-curbing legislation."

Key house members—Republicans as well as Democrats—with whom he conferred last night report that he appears to favor suggestions for a cooling off period and COMPULSORY arbitration when strike calls threaten defense production.

ALONG that line, the Office of Production Management has sent a trouble-shooter to St. Louis, where an intra-union jurisdictional row has called out 8,500 men and tied up many important defense orders.

Today's dispatches report: "Joseph Keenan, OPM labor expert, has arranged a conference (at St. Louis) with officials of the AFL machinists and the AFL hoisting engineers unions. "The two unions were in dispute as to which should represent TWENTY-FOUR garage workers."

A GREAT many people will believe that a dispute involving representation of 24 men hardly justifies calling 8,500 men out on a strike involving defense production.

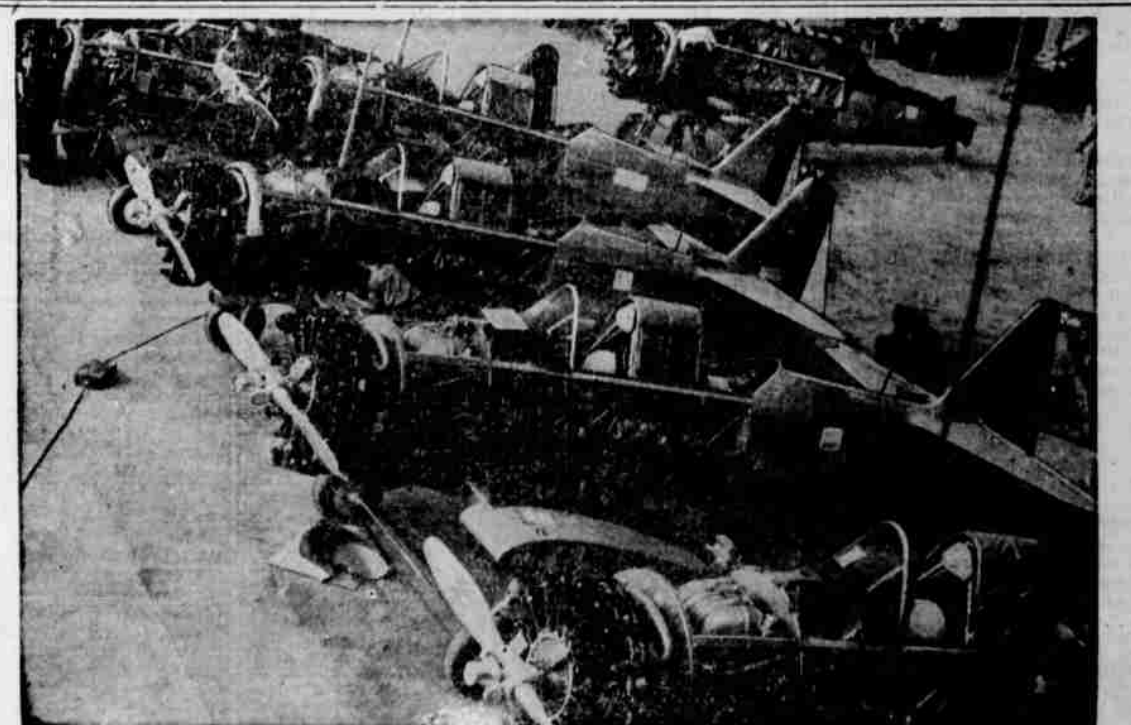
