

LEAGUE OF CITIES TO CONTINUE FIGHT FOR SHARE OF TAX

Recent Voluntary Allocation Of State Funds For City Street Repair Is Cited.

The regional meeting of the League of Oregon Cities here yesterday went on record as favoring continuance of the league's policy of the past few years of requesting through legislation an allocation of a small part of state gasoline tax revenue to cities for the maintenance and construction of streets.

This action came after a discussion on the general subject which was brought about by a talk by Virgil Langtry of Portland, field consultant of the league who reviewed the recent voluntary action of the state highway commission in allocating \$250,000 on a proportionate basis to cities for the repair and maintenance of streets which have been used more than usual of late by the movement of heavy defense material, such as logs, in trucks.

Officials Speak
Alan C. Blanchard, field representative of the division of social protection, federal security agency, described the work of his division as it relates to the national defense program. Craig Duer, city auditor of Grants Pass, discussed the local budget law and its requirements concerning itemization. James Q. Adams, city recorder of Ashland, Frank P. Farrell, city attorney of Medford, and A. E. Powell, Jackson county commissioner, presented their views regarding requirements for publication of budgets. Delegates from various cities described their park administrations and systems of police and fire reserves.

Other topics discussed were pension systems for public employees, reduction of fire insurance rates on municipal property, practice of cities in providing outside fire protection, and the county road tax law.

Deuel Presides
The league session opened with a luncheon in the Hotel Medford over which Mayor H. S. Deuel presided. After the luncheon the meeting was turned over to Mayor C. C. Chadwick of Salem, vice president of the league, and Mayor John Houston of Klamath Falls, a director of the league, who led discussions of the various municipal subjects which city officials and guests chose to present. City officials and department heads were present from Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass, Central Point, Eagle Point and Phoenix. Members of the Jackson county court also were present. Also attending was Orval Etter of Eugene, legal consultant of the league. It was announced that Mayor Earle Riley of Portland, who was to be present, was unable to come to Medford because of the illness of his wife and the death of Maj. Gen. George A. White.

Sherman Co. Enjoys Tax-Free Half Year

Moro, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Sherman county has money in the bank, enough money that the county decided today not to levy any taxes for county or road purposes for the first half of 1942.

The carry-over will be \$38,527.33 and the budget for the entire year is only \$64,912 for county purposes and roads.

The cash on hand accrued through heavy payment of delinquent taxes—the result of this year's big wheat crop and high prices.

Portland Eateries Will Advance Wage

Portland, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The Associated Restaurants of Portland will raise wages 10 percent on January 1, Ranson D. Meinke, secretary, said yesterday.

He said the raise was voluntary and would affect nearly 6,000 employees. Further adjustments will be made July 1, 1942, and Jan. 1, 1943, under an agreement with the AFL-Culinary Alliance. Raises are based on the department of labor's cost-of-living index.

BLITZ TRAINING WILL BE GIVEN AT FORT LEWIS

Forest and Rolling Prairie Termed Ideal For Thousands in Armored Forces.

Fort Lewis, Nov. 27.—(AP)—This military reservation of some 75 square miles of forests and rolling prairie lands may soon become the training center for many thousands of tank troops and armored forces. "Every time we bring our tanks out to prairies," Lieut. Col. G. H. Anderson, command-

er of the 752nd tank battalion, said today. "I tell my officers to be grateful for the miles without fences."

It's a Natural
"Say, if the 1st armored division at Fort Knox had as much unfenced land as I can stand here and look at, they would jump up and down with joy. Fort Lewis is a natural for the training of tank and armored troops."

When asked if a report that 200 tanks would soon be shipped to Fort Lewis—a rumor that has spread through the cantonment recently—might have some basis in fact, Colonel Anderson replied non-committally, "Could be."

The present construction of a "fourth echelon" establishment, costing \$1,500,000—equipped to assemble and overhaul heavy machinery, also hints at a future growth of mechanized forces at Fort Lewis.

Colonel Anderson said it was entirely possible there would be hundreds of tanks here some-

time this winter. "As far as tank troops are concerned, the two battalions here 732nd and 736th could soon be split into four battalions with shipments of trained troops from Fort Knox, Kentucky," he said.

100 Tanks Now

"The war department couldn't ask for anything more in training grounds. We have everything here, a great concentration of infantry troops and anti-tank forces, and miles of rolling prairies. Tanks and troops could be shipped and trained here without any trouble at all."

The two tank battalions at Fort Lewis now have almost 100 tanks, many of which are old model light vehicles. New medium 30-tonners, and new light tanks, weighing 12 tons, are arriving here every day.
