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## NATIONAL GUARD UNITS ARE SPLIT IN ARMY SERVICE

Individual Identity Lost As Men Are Shifted Around In Military Work.

Fort Lewis, Wash.—(P)—The 41st division will some day suffer the same fate as the old 91st division, which was disbanded shortly after the close of the last war.

The question of the future for the national guard outfits after the present crisis has been discussed many times at Fort Lewis but usually with the same conclusion—the original national guard unit or organization in the division is now so dislocated it could never return to its original plan.

When units of the national guard in the Pacific northwest were called into active service last fall, they were definitely attached by tradition to the cities and towns from which they came. The citizens of the community pointed with pride to "Company B" as "Sauk Center's own."

**Split Up**  
But what has become of Company B under the present emergency?

First, there were 60 draftees added to every 40 national guardsmen in the outfit. Most of the draftees came from out of the state—some even from New York and Georgia—and most of them had not the slightest affection for or interest in good old Sauk Center.

Next, both guardsmen and draftees were appointed to commissioned officers' and moved into other outfits.

And when congress made the recent ruling about sending men home who were over 28 and had served a year, more and more of the original Sauk Centerites went home.

Staff officers say the percentage of home-town men in the national guard companies and regiments may reach a low of 20 per cent by the middle of this winter.

**To Lose Regiment**  
The war department announced recently the 41st division will be streamlined. This means an entire infantry regiment will be sent to some other outfit's camp. It also means the outfit's three artillery regiments (which consist of six battalions)

will be changed over to make four artillery battalions. The two left over will also leave the parent organization.

And if the present emergency develops into a war, there will be continued transfers and casualties that will further alter the structure of the division.

So, when it comes time to muster company B out of service, there will be no point in taking it back to the state armory at Sauk Center because most of the boys would only have to run to the railroad station and grab the next train home to Chicago or Boston.
