Billy Hulen Says:

I. Pickem Takes Final Crack At Gridiron Games

Professor I. Pickem, peerless prognosticator, makes his final 1941 appearance today (loud cheers), and as Lady Luck would have it this week's batch of football fracas look like the toughest the pickster has yet encountered.

But due to numerous reverses during the season, and many falls from the limb, Prof. Pickem has become hardened to misfortune, and anything that may happen to his dozen selections this week will leave him cold and unmoved. In short, he is a veteran at the business of calling them wrong.

So, until next year, the Prof. says adieu, and hopes both his readers haven't lost as many chips on his prognostications as he has himself. Here they are:

MEDFORD-THE DALLES. All season Professor Pickem has placed the finger on the Black Tornado, and only once was the finger bitten—by the Ashland Grizzlies. He fervently hopes it is nipped again tonight, and this time by the Tigers, for the Prof. predicts that Medford will be defeated by The Dalles in their clash at the latter town. It looks to him like it will be two great prep elevens tangling in an even-up affair, with The Dalles having a hairline advantage because of playing at home and because Captain Curt Hopkins will not be available to the locals. OREGON-OREGON STATE. The Ducks might flap their wings with enough vigor to drive away all the Beavers' smell of "roses." It's strictly a tossup, but Pickem will string along with the Orange mainly because of those numerous Oregon injuries. OSC 6, Oregon 3.

STANFORD-CALIFORNIA. This is another traditional battle that could go in any direction, but the Golden Bears don't appear to have what it takes to stop the Indians. Stanford, by 13 to 6.

ARMY-NAVY. The gobs' superior manpower and Bill Busick should turn the tables for Annapolis, but by the narrow margin of 7 to 0.

WASHINGTON-U. S. C. Off their performance against Notre Dame the Trojans figure to be plenty hard to handle. However, Pickem'll take a flier on the Huskies, by 13 to 0.

TEXAS CHRISTIAN-S. M. U. With a prayer on his lips, the peerless prognosticator selects the Mustangs of S.M.U., 21 to 19.

BOSTON COLLEGE-HOLY CROSS. Another traditional game in which anything can happen, but B. C. looks by far the more powerful. Boston, 20 to 0.

TULANE-LOUISIANA STATE. The Green Wave has been ebbing and flowing all year, and Pickem believes this is one of the weeks it goes to town. Tulane, by 19 to 7.

FORDHAM-N.Y.U. The Rams will really pour it on their ancient Violet rivals. Fordham, 35 to 7.

PITTSBURGH-CARNEGIE TECH. Both are "de-emphasized," but Carnegie was more in earnest. So Pitt, by 26 to 12.

OKLAHOMA-NEBRASKA. Oklahoma is the slight betting favorite here, but Pickem'll risk a slim vote on the Cornhuskers, 7 to 6.

RICE-BAYLOR. In the Southwest conference anything is possible. Realizing that, Pickem still likes Rice to the tune of 20 to 14.

Excited Bomber Knocks Out Foe

San Jose, Calif., Nov. 28.—(P)—An unexpected flurry of hard blows last night excited Joe Louis, heavyweight boxing champion, so much that he knocked out George Giambastiano, Los Angeles heavyweight, in the third round of a scheduled four-round exhibition at municipal auditorium.

The business blow, a left hook flush to Giambastiano's jaw, came after one minute and 24 seconds of the third round.

The excitement developed after two rounds of colorless boxing in which Louis shuffled slowly around the ring toying with his sparring partner.

Suddenly in the third round, Giambastiano decided to exchange a few blows with the champion. He did and Joe retaliated with a Sunday punch.

TOMMERVIK LEADS ALL IN OFFENSE

Seattle, Nov. 28.—(P)—Marvin "Tommygun" Tommervik, 1940 little all-America halfback at Pacific Lutheran college near Tacoma, Wash., will wind up his senior year as the greatest total offensive gainer in minor college football.

American football statistical bureau figures released today show Tommervik has gained 1,762 yards from passing and rushing in eight games, and still has a game left against College of the Pacific at Tacoma tomorrow night in which he hopes to be the first to amass 2,000 yards in one season.

RAIN PREDICTED AS ELEVEN'S GIRD FOR BIG BATTLE

All Seats Sold—Hayward Fixes Braces And Splints For Injured Oregons.

Eugene, Nov. 28.—At least half of the 20,500 football fans fortunate enough to hold "high-premium" tickets for Saturday's Oregon-Oregon State classic will get wet, according to weather forecasts made here this morning. But regardless of weather conditions and the inevitable poor footing of Hayward field, the lighter weight OSC eleven continues as a 5-to-4 betting favorite to win this 45th meeting between the two traditional intra-state rivals.

Eugene hotels and local tourist cabins have been reserved for weeks, and late comers have been forced to seek accommodations as far north as Junction City and south to Cottage Grove.

No General Admission There were 16 tickets still on sale when the office closed last night, but these "horseshoe ducks" were gobbled up early this morning. There was little speculation, but mid-field tickets were selling at \$15 per pair. There will be no general admission for the game here tomorrow.

Through the assistance of Colonel Bill Hayward, track coach and retired trainer, Tex Oliver is expected to be able to use most of his "cripples." Hayward has fashioned special braces and splints for the injured Webfoots. Only Ray Seagle, regular guard, and Bill Regner, regular end, are expected to be out of the starting lineups. The entire squad is suffering from injuries, but few are other than those naturally accumulated during a heavy schedule such as the Webfoots have played.

"BEAT OREGON," Nov. 28.—(P)—Campus fever began to soar today in anticipation of Saturday's football game at Eugene between the possible Rose Bowlers, Oregon State, and their final hurdle, the University of Oregon.

"Beat Oregon" signs appeared on cars, windows and cut-out lines in the Daily Barometer, student newspaper, but Rose Bowl talk was hushed.

The traditional rivalry between the two schools was all the students needed to work up enthusiasm, and talk of bowl possibilities was with a crossed-finger tone and a weather eye.

LONGHORNS BLAST AGGIES, 23 TO 0 AS SEASON NEARS END

New York, Nov. 28.—(P)—The fading football season is facing its last big day with the problem of producing opponents for most of the bowl contests and settling several family feuds.

Yesterday's second edition of the Thanksgiving holiday furnished one major scrap in which once-mighty Texas returned to form and kicked Texas A. and B. right out of the ranks of the unbeaten and untied by the score of 23-0.

For the second time in years, Coach Dana Bible's Longhorns ruined a perfect record for their rivals at A. and M., although this time the Aggies had the southwest conference title safely tucked away.

Another southwest entry, tail-end Arkansas, kept its season from being a total flop by whipping Tulsa, champion of the Missouri valley, 13-6.

Fullback Jack Faubion scored all the touchdowns for Oklahoma A. and M., which trounced Wichita (Kas.) university, 33-13. Elsewhere in the southwest, Arkansas Teachers nosed Arkansas Tech, 7-6. McMurry blanked Oklahoma City university, 7-0, and Ouachita stopped Henderson State by the same score.

Louisiana Tech crushed Centenary, 39-7, and Chattanooga whipped Mercer, 40-14. Tennessee Tech shut out the Middle Tennessee Teachers, 6-0. Florida A. and M. scored a 27-0 victory over Xavier of New Orleans, Norris Brown dumped Clark, 32-0, and LeMoyne triumphed over Arkansas State, 7-0.

Tomorrow's headliner is that annual classic at Philadelphia between a talented navy team that will be playing its last game for Coach Swede Larson and a scrappy army eleven that will be completing its first season under Coach Earl Blaik.

Football Briefs

Palo Alto, Cal., Nov. 28.—(P)—Stanford settled today on a starting backfield lineup 75 percent first string, and the betting odds on an Indian victory in tomorrow's big game against California still stood 2½ to 1.

The final strenuous workout found Frankie Albert, Pete Kmetovic, Eric Armstrong and Bob Crane in the ball-carrying department. Coach Clark D. Shaughnessy indicated that is the way they will take the field in the test that means everything to Stanford's Rose bowl hopes.

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 28.—(P)—Sophomore Billy, brother to veteran tackle Bob Reinhard, appeared today to be invested with a large measure of California's hopes for "big game" victory over Stanford.

The younger Reinhard, a left halfback, can run faster than any of his fellow Bears, is a skilled passer and has performed brilliantly on regular occasions through the season.

In the past two days, said Coach Stub Allison, the sophomore ball carrier has progressed remarkably and now stands No. 2 in the left halfback lists. Senior Al Derian is nominated to start the game, but Allison indicated that Reinhard would be thrown into action at the climactic moments.

Soggy Field Expected for Medford-The Dalles Clash

Medford's Black Tornado arrived in The Dalles early yesterday afternoon to find that Amotan field, scene of its climactic clash with the unbeaten and untied Indians tonight, was wet and muddy and would probably offer insecure footing at kickoff time, according to a telegram received from Russ Acheson, assistant coach.

Russ wired that, although the weather was clear and cold, the gridiron was soggy from recent rains. This factor was expected to prove advantageous to The Dalles, who outweigh the Tigers 10 pounds per man, according to Acheson.

The Tornado squad, when it stepped off the train in the Columbia river city, was met by The Dalles band and hundreds of business men and students, and escorted to its hotel. Acheson wired that the betting on the game was even, although most fanatics in the home town believed the Indians would win. However, Russ observed, The Dalles hasn't forgotten the 41 to 0 beating they received from Medford in 1928, and the 6 to 0 blanking they suffered here last season in the semi-final game of the title playoffs.

There will be no change in Medford's original starting lineup, according to the telegram. This means that Bill Wall and Darrell Monteith will open at the ends, Stan Smith and Bud Mayfield at the tackles, Wes Davis and Bob Mitchell at the guards, Dan Winter at center, Bob Stead at quarterback, Ike Orr and Cato Wray at the halfbacks and Cliff Jones at fullback.
