

FARM INCOME GAIN AND HIGHER COSTS FORESEEN FOR '42

Report By Extension Service
Tells of Outlook For
Farmers in Coming Year.

Corvallis—(Spl.)—Gross farm income in Oregon in 1942 should be materially above the 1941 level if present trends continue, although net income will not increase proportionately because of rising farm costs, according to an analysis made by the extension service at Oregon State college and published in the current agricultural situation and outlook report. Complete copies of the report may be had at any county extension office.

The demand outlook for farm products in 1942 is even better than in the exceptionally favorable year now ending, the report says. More business activity, a rising general price level and increased demand for some products for export will play a part in the situation for next year, the report shows.

Food Consumption Gain
Further increase in domestic payrolls and military employment is expected to bring an increase in the per capita consumption of food. On the whole it is expected that national income in 1942 may exceed that of 1941 by 10 or 15 per cent. With the British government expecting to obtain about one-fourth of its food supplies from America next year, approximately 8 to 10 per cent of the farm production of the United States will be exported, or about twice the exports of 1941, the report states.

Advance estimates indicate that the 1941 gross farm income will exceed that of 1940 by about 25 per cent, making it the greatest since 1929. The

increase in farm costs, however, is expected to be a little more in 1942 than it was in 1941. The average of about 15 per cent increase this year was caused mostly by higher prices for labor, rent and feed, the report points out. In 1942 the increases are expected to be felt in purchases of seed, automobiles and tractors, building materials, feed, containers and other items of equipment and supplies.

The Oregon farm price index at mid-October showed the general level of farm prices at 94 per cent of the 1926-30 average, 125 per cent of the 1910-14 figure.

1 1/2 cups flour
8 teaspoons baking powder
1/3 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup sugar
1 beaten egg or 2 yolks
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons fat, melted
Mix ingredients lightly, pour into greased pan. Cover with Top Spread.

SCHOOL NETWORK SET UP TO HELP CIVILIAN MORALE

Elaborate System of Information And Discussion Groups to Cover Nation.

Washington (U.P.)—The United States is preparing to go all out for boosting civilian morale with an elaborate network of information and discussion groups that will blanket the country's educational system from first grade to college seniors.

It is called the School and College Civilian Morale Service and its first objective is to establish "freedom's forums" in every community and classroom for a "free discussion" at regular intervals of all the problems now plaguing the nation and the world.

President's Idea
Even as this is being written, pamphlets on methods of participation are going out from the U. S. office of education to more than 1,700 college presidents; 18,000 school superintendents; 26,000 high school principals; 9,000 librarians; and many civic organizations.

This latest development in trying to prepare the United States to face the world situation and national upheaval was born with the president. In September, he wrote the federal security administrator, Paul V. McNutt, instructing him to ask U. S. Commissioner of Education John W. Studebaker to "inaugurate an appropriate educational program designed to help students and adults in understanding the many complicated problems of these critical times."

Draw Plan
In the ensuing two months, Studebaker, with the aid of McNutt, the civilian defense director, Fiorello LaGuardia, a na-

tional advisory committee of 21 college presidents and other prominent educators, drew up the present preliminary outline of the school and college civilian morale service. Actually, it is a broad expansion of the public forums program started five years ago—but if present plans are carried out it will call for participation of millions of students and adults who have never taken part in any of the existing "study-discussion groups."
