Pharmacy Board Rule Challenged in Court

Portland, Nov. 28—(P)—Hudson-Duncan & company filed suit in circuit court yesterday to enjoin the Oregon board of pharmacy from enforcing an order restricting sales of proprietary medicines and household remedies to drug stores.

The order, effective January 2, has no relation to the public health and affords the public no protection, the complaint says, asserting it would give druggists sole sale of toothpastes, nose drops, headache cures, cough syrups, cleaning fluid, rubbing ointment, laxatives and mouth wash.

Huge Bend Sawmill Closed by Walkout

Bend, Ore., Nov. 28—(P)—One of the largest pine milling operations in the west closed yesterday as Brooks-Scanlon company mill and woods crews struck.

Pot Roast
Dinner For 4 or 8
Hot Tomato Juice
Gravy
Pot Roast
Corn Stuffing
Buttered Green Beans
Hot Rolls
Currant Jam
Jellied Vegetable Salad
Date Nut Pudding
Coffee

4 pound chuck
¼ cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
¼ teaspoon celery salt
4 tablespoons chopped suet
¼ cup boiling water
Sprinkle meat with flour mixed with seasonings. Brown quickly on all sides in suet heated in deep pan. Add water and lid. Simmer 3 hours. Turn meat several times. Remove to heated platter. Mix 1 tablespoon flour with 1 of butter and add to drippings left in pan. Boil 2 minutes. Pour over meat.

Corn Stuffing (Baked)
3 cups cubed bread
1 cup corn
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon chopped onions
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
1 egg, beaten
1/3 cup hot milk
4 tablespoons butter, melted
Mix ingredients lightly and pour into shallow greased pan. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Cut in squares and serve with meat.

Date Nut Pudding
2/3 cup dark brown sugar
1/3 cup flour
¼ teaspoon salt
1 egg
2 cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
¼ cup chopped dates
1/3 cup pecans or black walnuts
¼ cup whipped cream
Mix sugar with flour and salt. Add egg and milk. Cook over low heat until thick and creamy. Stir constantly. Add vanilla and dates. Beat well and cool. Lightly mix in nuts and cream. Chill.

TWO DIE IN FALL OF NAVAL PLANE

San Diego, Calif., Nov. 28—(P)—A naval scout bomber crashed and burned shortly after taking off from the North Island naval air station yesterday, and both its occupants were killed.

The pilot was Russell L. Garner, 33, of Orlando, Fla., an enlisted navy flier. As a passenger, Garner had Theodore H. Church, 19, a marine private, from Olympia, Wash.

The plane fell into a spin at low altitude. A navy board is investigating the circumstances leading to the accident, fifth this month involving navy planes based at San Diego.

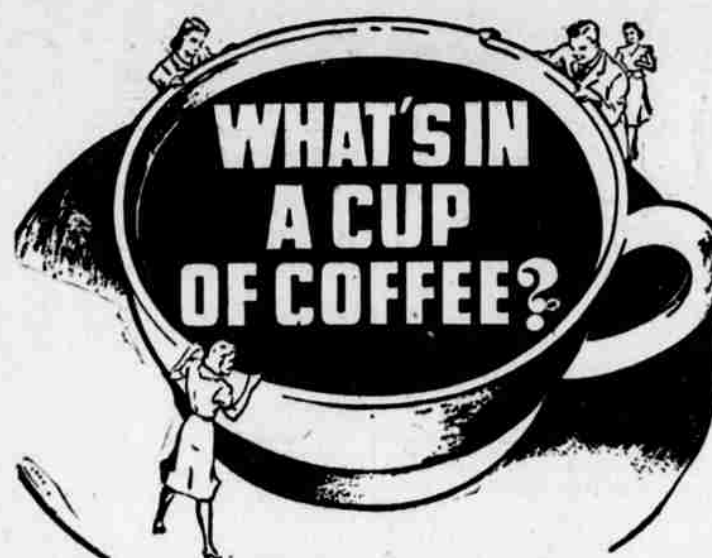
