\$11,000 AWARDED IN DAMAGE SUIT

A circuit court jury, returned a verdict today awarding Waldo Green, \$10,000 general damages, and \$1,000 special damages in his personal injury damage suit against H. L. Adams of Puyallup, Wash. Green sought \$20,000 general damages and \$1,000 special damages. The jury deliberated slightly more than an hour and brought in their verdict just before noon. The trial started last Tuesday.

The suit was based on an auto accident in the Siskiyou on the Pacific highway in July 1940. Green, a motorcyclist, crashed into the rear end of a parked auto, sustaining a broken leg and other injuries.

The plaintiff contended Adams was negligent in attempting to pass a truck without a clear view ahead. The defense was contributory negligence.

The award was one of the largest in the history of Jackson county in a damage suit.
