

SERVICE GIVEN BY AMERICAN LEGION IS TOLD AT MEET

Sid George of Eugene Is Speaker at Post Gathering—Armistice Report Given

An inspiring talk on the American Legion and its service to the community, state and nation highlighted the regular semi-monthly session of Medford Post No. 15 at the Armory Wednesday night. Sid George of Eugene, past state commander of the American Legion, was principal speaker and his review of the Legion organization since its inception was followed by a comprehensive survey of the American Legion today and what it means to the peace and security of the nation.

A comprehensive report of the recent Armistice Day celebration was presented by General Chairman Herman Purucker who tendered to the adjutant a volume covering the annual celebration, complete in every detail. Mr. Purucker spoke at length of

the various phases of the annual program and made several constructive suggestions for the guidance of future committees. He also expressed his sincere appreciation for the splendid cooperation of the scores of local Legionnaires, as well as the public-spirited citizens who assisted in making the 1941 celebration such a big success.

The fact that there was no football game this year was deplored by all present and it was suggested that every effort be made to assure an Armistice Day football game next year. In this connection, the following committee was named to confer with high school authorities: H. L. Bromley, Walter Looker and E. W. Winkle.

The annual district conference of the Legion, which was scheduled for November 29 has been postponed, according to Post Commander Winkle, who advised all members that the new dates would be made public as soon as available. Membership for 1942 is away to a flying start, according to Adjutant Fritz Nissen who stated that Medford Post has a total of 158 members to date and with a little effort should be well over the top by January 1. In this connection, he read a letter from L. F. Ivanhoe who sent in his 1942 dues from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, over a month.

The annual Christmas party will be held in December, exact date and full details to be announced later, according to Commander Winkle who advised that as usual this holiday affair would be in the capable hands of the auxiliary.

Following the meeting the Legionnaires were guests of the auxiliary members for a delectable supper.
