

WIND-UP ACCOUNT WORK ARMY CAMP ENDED THURSDAY

Final work of winding up the accounts of Myron Hunt and H. C. Chambers-Blackie and Wood, architect-engineer for the proposed army cantonment here, will be completed by Tuesday, Capt. Theron W. Bean, constructing quartermaster said yesterday. Myron Hunt, the architect, and Harold I. Wood, the engineer, will then be in readiness to leave. Mr. Hunt's firm is in Los Angeles, Mr. Wood's, San Francisco. The two men have been here since early May, being in charge of the cantonment advance planning under Capt. Bean representing the army.

Thomas A. Scadden, zone 9 insurance examiner, San Francisco, yesterday completed his examination of the architect-engineer's insurance accounts. Mr. Scadden arrived here by plane Thursday night and was to continue from here to Albany, also the site of a proposed cantonment.

When the architect-engineer's job was completed a short time ago, Capt. Bean augmented his staff to carry on the work of making changes in the drawings as ordered at Washington, D. C. A few more local workers were added to the staff last week, increasing the personnel to 44 yesterday. About three weeks' work remained on hand yesterday, Capt. Bean said. Additional changes, however, might prolong the work.

Mr. Wood, here since May 4, plans to leave Tuesday with Mrs. Wood for their home in Los Altos, Cal. His firm has a new reclamation job in northern California.

Mr. Wood said he and Mrs. Wood had enjoyed their stay here and valued the friendships they had made. He said he might return to Medford if construction of the proposed cantonment is authorized as the government has an option on the services of the architect-engineer on the building job. During the advance planning of the camp the architect-engineer's staff comprised 153 persons at the maximum.

Mr. Wood said he was not a stranger in Medford, having visited here frequently 21 years ago when he worked on the Granada irrigation district project.

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DEATH COMES TO PERRY L. WAIT, 68

Perry L. Wait, 68, a resident of Sardine creek near Gold Hill where he had resided for the last 25 years and operated the Laurelwood poultry farm, passed away at his home there early Saturday morning. Death was sudden and unexpected.

'CLASSMATE' TELLS OF PEET TRAVELS

Appearing in the November 23 issue of Classmate, Methodist church youth weekly news magazine, is a story entitled "A Missionary Journey." This writing concerns the journeys of James and Harriet Peet, mother of Mrs. Ira Jones and grandmother of Mrs. A. E. Brockway, both of route 2.

The Peets, Methodist missionaries, left their home in western New York in the spring of 1855 for a frontier point, 180 miles north of St. Paul, Minn., where they were to take up their duties as Methodist missionaries. The "travel-log" is written by Edward L. Peet, grandson of the Peets.

The story relates their journey by sleigh in the winter months to their far north outpost; their contacts with friendly Indians and an accident in which the sleigh overturned upon Mrs. Peet. They spent five years in this outpost before returning to their annual conference. Mr. Peet died in 1866 but Mrs. Peet continued to give her life in missionary work.

Mr. Peet, author of the story, is pastor in Hartford, Conn., and with Mrs. Peet and daughter visited in Medford several years ago.
