Over one hundred people from Jackson, Josephine and Siskiyou counties are expected to attend the annual meeting of the Crater Lake Area Council, Boy Scouts of America to be held next Sunday in Medford, according to Kenneth Wells, local Boy Scout executive.

It will feature the award of Loyalty Dedication trophies, election of officers for 1942, award of the Silver Beaver, special ceremonies and the principal speaker, Walter R. Whidden, deputy regional scout executive from Portland.

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MEDFORD MAN TO FACE NEW PROBE IN GIRLS' DEATH

Klamath Judge Orders Grand Jury To Investigate Case Of Eugene Hugh Smith.

Klamath Falls, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg today directed the Klamath county grand jury to investigate the case of Eugene Hugh Smith, 35-year-old Medford service station operator, sentenced here for failure to stop at the scene of an accident. Smith is already at the Salem penitentiary to begin his five-year sentence, which was imposed in connection with the death of Marie Etta Russell, a high school girl found fatally injured October 25 beside The Dalles-California highway north.

Judge Vandenberg told the jury there were indications of public dissatisfaction over the sentence, the maximum permitted under the charge filed against Smith. He directed the jury to determine if there is evidence to warrant a more serious charge than that to which Smith pleaded guilty.

Linked By Witness
Through his attorney at the time of sentence, Smith told the court the girl leaped from his car as it sped on the highway. He was connected with the case through the license number of his car, which was jotted down by Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose when he saw Smith invite Miss Russell to get into his automobile on a local street.

After the girl left his car on the highway north, Smith drove on to Fort Klamath and later to Medford, without reporting to authorities. He was arrested at Medford.
