SECOND STABBING IN EIGHT DAYS ON POLICE RECORDS

Another knife brawl, Medford's second in eight days, early this morning sent Newell S. Seals, 32, who gave his address as Chemawa, Ore., to Community hospital with painful but not serious cuts.

Held in city jail after allegedly admitting the knifing was Edward Woodruff, 41, a local cook, Police planned to file a formal charge against Woodruff after talking to Seals sometime today.

The victim of the brawl, police said, suffered a cut on his upper lip and across the palm of his left hand, a small gash above the left kidney and a small puncture of the left shoulder.

Scene of the fight, according to police, was a North Fir street restaurant, where the two men, both of whom had been drinking, became involved in an argument that led to the knife play. The brawl occurred about 5 a. m.

Jack Edwards, 26, employee of a local tavern, was also taken to jail with Woodruff, on a charge of drunkenness. Police said, however, that Edwards was not involved in the fracas.

On November 24 A. W. Finley, 53, was slashed with a knife wielded by Dennis D. Dulworth, 33, who was bound over to the grand jury under \$2,500 bail on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

DELUGE IN PARK HEAVIEST SINCE RECORD STARTED

Medford residents were greeted by a driving rain this morning while reports from Crater Lake national park by shortwave radio indicated that the park was receiving the greatest rainfall since records have been kept there. From 4:30 p. m. yesterday until 8:30 a. m. today rainfall at the lake totaled 3.37 inches.

Rainfall was general throughout the valley and was accompanied by a wind which weather bureau reported as a little out of the ordinary for Medford and vicinity. Rain from 4:30 a. m. yesterday to 4:30 p. m. this morning totaled 4.00 inches. Later precipitation figures were not available due to telephone disorders but indications were for continued rain during the day. Occasional rain was forecast for Wednesday with cooler weather.

Fish lake, main source of supply for the Medford irrigation, reported rain with snow anticipated if the weather turned cooler. Watermaster Clinton Smith said.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2.—(P)—A southeast storm warning from San Francisco to Brookings, Ore., was issued by the weather bureau today.

Southerly gales were forecast for today and tonight. Occasional rain, with strong winds, was general from the Sacramento valley northward.
