

18 REDS GUILTY OF CONSPIRING TO CAUSE REBELLION

Socialist Workers Face Jail
Terms—Verdict Is First
Under Smith Amendment.

Minneapolis, Dec. 2.—(AP)—A possible federal prison term up to 10 years loomed today before 18 persons, members of or associated with the Socialist Workers Party who were convicted by a jury here on charges of conspiracy to create insubordination in the armed forces of the government.

Albert Goldman, New York attorney and one of those convicted last night, announced that "every legal step and every other resource would be exhausted for appeal purposes."

He immediately made plans for filing an appeal before Judge M. M. Joyce in federal court here next Saturday.

Sentence Monday

Judge Joyce set next Monday as the date for sentencing.

Conviction of the 18 defendants was on one of two counts of an indictment returned last July after a raid on the Socialist Workers Party offices here and in St. Paul. Bushels of literature were seized in the raid, and introduced in evidence at the trial, along with two red flags and several pictures of Leon Trotsky, communist leader who was assassinated in Mexico.

Court attaches said the verdict marked the first convictions under the Smith amendment to the sedition act of 1940. That amendment, added to the law in June, 1940, makes it unlawful to advocate overthrow of the government.

Oklahomans Curious About Coast Reports Of Secession Effort

Oklahomans are exceedingly curious about the secession movement of Oregon's Curry county and the four northern California counties that want to form a new state, Walter K. Clifton of 425 North Columbus avenue said today after his return home from Alva, Okla.

News stories of the secession movement were featured in Oklahoma papers and people just didn't know what to make of it all, Mr. Clifton said. They do know, however, what to make of Oklahoma sales taxes and they definitely don't like the levies which in some instances are 20 per cent of the retail price, Mr. Clifton asserted. The people don't see where any good is being done by the sales tax revenue and so they are complaining about it, he said.

Flying Showcase Hangs Motionless In Tacoma's Sky

Tacoma, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The army tested a new-type plane over Tacoma today and its peculiarities in the air resulted in a flood of telephone calls to newspaper offices.

The plane, a new-type observation two-seater, dubbed by airmen as a "flying showcase" because of its numerous glass windows, appeared almost motionless in the air. The plane can land and take off on a field only about 100 yards long. When bucking a head wind it can remain almost motionless in the air over an object on the ground.

Roseburg, Ore., Dec. 2.—(AP)—When the seven pound daughter born this morning to Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Schmidt of Camas valley is required at some future date to designate the place of birth, the answer, to conform to literal truth, will have to be "a Ford automobile on highway 99, somewhere near Roseburg, Oregon."

COWGILL RETIRES FROM ARMY DUTY

Fort Lewis, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Col. Ralph P. Cowgill, of Portland, retired from active military duty today as commander of the 186th (Oregon) infantry regiment.

The 82nd brigade, composed of the 162nd and 186th regiments, marched in review in the colonel's honor this afternoon.

Colonel Cowgill retired under the war department's age limit of 58.

Col. Cowgill made his home in Medford for about 15 years, leaving here to make his home in Portland following his promotion in army rank.

TACOMA PUPILS ON VACATION AS JANITORS STRIKE

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Seventeen thousand school children of 38 public schools began a forced vacation today because of a strike by janitors, furnace and maintenance men.

Several thousand pupils remained at home, but others who went to class were being sent home during the cold, rainy morning as rooms got colder. No fires were reported in school house furnaces.

Ray Moiso, AFL-Tacoma Building and Trades Council official, said the union was demanding a 20 per cent increase in pay. Teachers recently received restoration of their pay to pre-depression levels and all city workers, including policemen, have received pay increases this year.

The strikers contended their pay was still at the depression level and varied from \$75 to \$193 monthly.

Dreaded Nazi Raider Sunk by Australians At Cost of Cruiser

London, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The 830-ton Australian cruiser Sydney has sunk one of Germany's most dreaded sea raiders of this war but an official announcement today said she apparently paid for the triumph with her own life and the lives of 645 men aboard her.

She fought her last fight with the heavily armed, 9,400-ton German Steiermark somewhere off Australia, probably not far from the Cocos Islands.

The Steiermark, sailing under the name of Kormoran, had sunk nine British, British-allied or neutral ships in at least three oceans before the 6,830-ton Sydney came to mortal grips with her.

The Steiermark's survivors told the story of the combat. None of the Sydney's men were found and the Australian government, after scouring the battle area with planes and ships, announced that "it must be presumed that she has been lost."

No date was given for the struggle but Australian Prime Minister John Curtin disclosed that next of kin of the Sydney's missing 42 officers and 603 men had been informed November 26.

SPOKANE BATTLES THREE-BELL FIRE

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 2.—(AP)—All available downtown equipment was called out shortly after noon today to combat a three-alarm fire in the center of the Spokane business district.

Reportedly starting from an explosion in the office of the Northern Optical company, the fire by 12:30 had destroyed the fifth and sixth floors of the Fernwell building, at Riverside and Stevens, and was reported by firemen to still be burning fiercely.

So rapidly did the blaze spread that firemen were forced to take several persons from the upper stories of the building with extension ladders and a number of others, including a mother and baby in arms were forced to flee down fire escapes.

ant, and Frank Bacon, field auditor, Capt. Bean said. He added, however, that about a third of the civilians would be re-employed at the San Francisco office.

"I should like to take them all to San Francisco, but unfortunately this can't be done," Capt. Bean commented. The permanent clerical force at the San Francisco office will be able to handle much of the work of the Marysville, Albany and Medford projects, he pointed out, the consolidation, to this extent, being an economy move.

Capt. Bean has been here since early last May when he came from Vancouver Barracks, Wash., to establish the constructing quartermaster's office in the army. A few days later the civilian architect-engineering firm of Myron Hunt and H. C. Chambers-Blackie and Wood moved into the army and began the advance planning and blueprinting of the proposed 35,000-troop cantonment in the Beagle-Antelope district. At peak work, the architect-engineer staff comprised 153 persons.

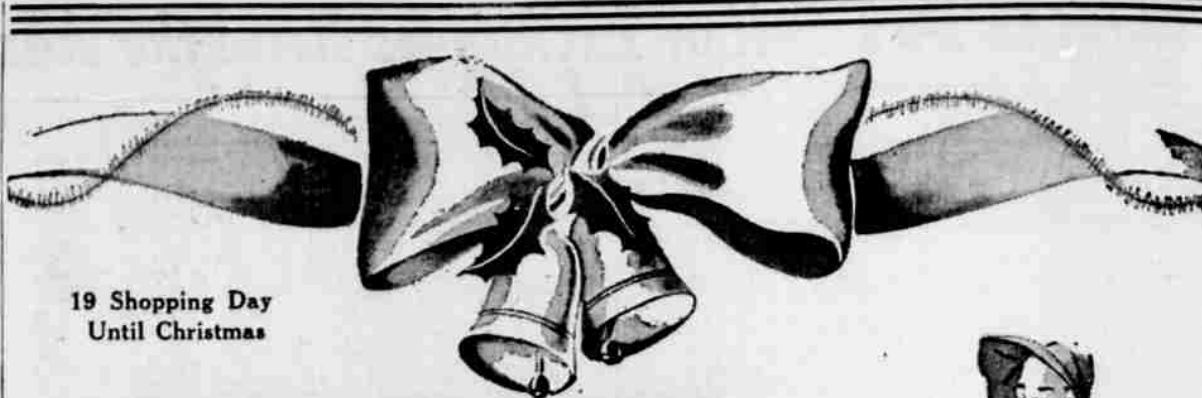
