

PATRIOT MEET IS SLATED HERE BY DEFENSE COUNCIL

Public Gathering December
15 in Holly Theater To
Feature Bill Of Rights.

A public meeting to pay respect to the American bill of rights and to dwell on the meaning of the liberty and freedom embodied in the Constitutional declaration will be held in the Holly theater at 7:45 p. m. December 15 under the auspices of the Jackson County Council of Defense.

Principal speaker will be Neil P. Allen of Grants Pass, past state president of the American Legion and now vice chairman of the Legion's national committee on civilian defense. Frank Hull, the defense council's coordinator announced. The high school band will give a concert of appropriate music and there will be singing by the assemblage, he said.

All religious, patriotic and fraternal organizations will participate in the ceremony, Mr. Hull stated. Similar meetings will be held all over the country under the auspices of civilian defense councils or patriotic organizations. President Roosevelt is to broadcast a talk on the bill of rights during the afternoon.

Mr. Hull urged everyone to make plans now to attend the meeting. The large Holly theater, he said, was procured through the generosity of the George A. Hunt Theatres, Inc.

JACKSON COUNTY SEAL SALE GOAL \$2900 THIS YEAR

With a 10 per cent increase announced in Jackson county's goal for the 1941 Christmas seal sale, a total of \$2,900 will be sought in the campaign, now underway in all sections of the county, Miss Helen Bullis, county chairman, reported yesterday. If the county raises \$2,900 for the fight against tuberculosis, seventy-five per cent of the money, as usual, will be retained for work within this county, the remainder going into state and national tuberculosis funds. The higher goal has been set because of the increased need to battle for public health in times of stress, when so much money and so much attention is necessarily given to other forms of national defense.

The increased goals were announced by Mrs. Saidie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association. Tuberculosis, she pointed out, has always shown a tendency to increase in war time. Undernourishment is always conducive to tuberculosis where the tendency exists. Army examinations have revealed enough undernourishment in this country to arouse the nation, Mrs. Dunbar stated. One of the chief projects of the Jackson County Public Health association, financed by the seal sale, is the supply of milk to tuberculosis contacts.

Specialist to Give Brightening Ideas For Family Menus

Feeding the family takes on major proportions around this time of year and Miss Lucy Case, Oregon State college extension specialist in foods and nutrition, will be in Jackson county December 4 to 6 to help project leaders with this problem, according to Miss Marian J. Farrell, home demonstration agent.

She will conduct three meetings. Thursday the project will be "Cookery of Frozen Foods;" Friday, "Meals From the Pantry Shelf for the B Group Units;" and Saturday, "Cookery of Cheaper Cuts of Meat."

The above projects will then be presented in the local extension units during the month of December and January. With rising prices and the necessity of using canned or frozen foods at this season of the year, this project is a timely one that will provide many new ideas to take the monotony out of meals.

ROTARIANS HEAR CORN AND DUFF AT LUNCH MEET

E. C. Corn, Medford fruit grower, gave Medford Rotary club his impressions gained on a recent eastern trip, as a feature of the club's Tuesday luncheon meeting at Hotel Medford. Robert Duff, water board superintendent, also contributed to the program with a brief discussion of the geological factors which made possible Medford's fine municipal water supply from Big Butte Springs.

Mr. Corn told first of the inspiration he secured from a visit to American shrines—Concord bridge, Lexington and the Statue of Liberty. His visit to great eastern cities was also related.

"Great cities offer the greatest challenge of democracy," Mr. Corn warned, pointing out that the Harlem section of New York City alone had a population of 300,000 negroes, seventy per cent of whom are on relief. Washington is a city of confusion, Mr. Corn said. There seems definitely the need for practical organization and intelligent action. An optimistic note however, was sounded by the speaker when he expressed the belief that American vision, energy, resourcefulness and strong heart will safeguard this nation's destiny.

President of U. of O. To
Speak at Court House

Jackson County League of Women Voters are anticipating the visit of Dr. Donald Erb, University of Oregon president, to Medford when he will address league members and others interested, Thursday evening at the court house auditorium at 8 o'clock.

Dr. Erb has chosen as his topic, "Some Problems of Economic Policy." This will be an open meeting and all Rogue valley residents who are interested in hearing Dr. Erb are invited. There will be no admission charge.

Commenting on his topic Dr. Erb said, "Among all of the problems facing us today none are more important than the economic ones. Inflation, price control, defense financing, stimulating production, production quotas and similar topics are all economic and affect the very basis of our defense preparation."

Dr. Erb is known for his liberal economic teachings. He received his BS and MS in economics at the University of Illinois and continued his studies at Harvard in the subject where he received his MA and PhD. Before taking up his duties at University of Oregon as president he was professor of economics at Stanford. He is a member of the American and Pacific Coast Economic associations.

HULL TO ATTEND REGION MEETING ABOUT HOUSING

Frank Hull, director of the homes registration office being established here to maintain a continuous housing inventory, plans to leave Saturday evening for San Francisco to attend a regional meeting of directors Monday and Tuesday.

Representatives of the Home Owners Loan corporation, federal housing administration, work projects administration and the reconditioning section of the homes registration division will attend and explain all the points of the housing programs. Mr. Hull was informed by a letter from Howard Strong, director of homes registration division, executive office of the president, office for emergency management, division of defense housing coordination, Washington, D. C.

The matter of continuous housing surveys was first broached here a few weeks ago by Sigurd Nylander, field adviser of the same long-named agency to which Mr. Strong belongs. Subsequently Mr. Hull was sent a supply of franked envelopes various reporting forms and books of instructions. A telegraphic report on housing was to be sent to Washington on the

21st of the month and a written report on the 27th.

City councilmen last night decided to learn more about the need and usefulness of such a project before authorizing a contribution to the estimated expense of \$100 a month to maintain a housing survey office here.
