Sen. Holman Charges Many Irregularities In Defense Contracts

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 3.—(P) Senator Holman (R., Ore.) said yesterday there were widespread irregularities in the administration's awarding of defense contracts.

"I have more apprehension about the internal debacle that is threatening this country, due to fiscal mismanagement, than any danger from a foreign power," he told the Phoenix Republican luncheon club.

The committee of Senator Truman (D., Mo.) for checking complaints in the letting of arms contracts has 36 investigators working and still can't keep up with its work," he continued.

"In one instance, for example, a \$16,000,000 contract for machine gun mountings was given to a washing machine company at \$90,685 above the lowest bid, and the washing machine company didn't even bid on the contract."
