Fashioned by a poll of coaches and sports writers in the four loop cities, the eighth annual Mail Tribune All-Southern Oregon conference football selections, released today, showed the first eleven to be composed of five members of Medford's Black Tornado, four stalwarts of the Klamath Falls Pelicans and two stars of the Ashland Grizzlies.

On the second team are five Medford men and three each from Klamath Falls and Ashland. These three teams tied for the league championship, each with two victories and one defeat. The inexperienced Grants Pass Cavemen, losers of their three conference tilts, failed to land a man on either the first or second aggregation.

With each of the eight coaches and writers naming their own first and second teams, and with two points being given for first team mention and one for second, the balloting for several positions was the closest in the history of the all-star selections. Also, for the first time in several years, nary a player received 16 points from unanimous first team mention.

Captain Curt Hopkins, Medford's stellar left end who suffered three broken ribs in the next-to-last game of the season, polled the highest point-total of any player in the conference. He received six first team votes and one second eleven mention for 13 points. He was followed closely by Eugene Love, Klamath's great fullback and Ike Orr, Tornado right halfback, both of whom polled 12 points.

Love Captain
Love, with five votes for first-team captain, becomes leader of the mythical "varsity," while Ashland's Bud Provost, fullback, was given three captaincy votes and thereby becomes the "boss" of the second team.

There were three first-team repeaters from the 1940 selections—Ashland's Charles Jandreau, left halfback; Medford's Ike Orr and Medford's Bill Wall, who made an end position this year after being selected as a tackle last season. There were no second-team repeaters, but Wray and Love jumped from 1940's second eleven to 1941's first aggregation. Of last year's honorable mention players, Ashland's Provost and Guard Bob Mitchell of Medford moved up to this season's second team. Russell Hawk, Ashland center, was again accorded honorable mention for polling three or more points.

Lining up on the first team are both Medford ends, Hopkins and Wall; Tackles Bud Mayfield of Medford and Chet Fowler of Ashland; both Klamath Falls guards, Jack Mitchell and Jack Rich; the Klamath center, giant Phil Blohm; and in the backfield, Klamath's Love, Ashland's Jandreau, and Medford's Wray and Orr.

Neil Mayfield of Klamath and Johnny Bell of Ashland captured the second team end positions, Martin Herrin of Ashland and Buster Vogel of Klamath the tackle berths, Bob Mitchell and Jim Glenn, both of Medford, the guard posts, Dan Winter of Medford the center spot, while in the back-

field are Medford's Bob Stead and Cliff Jones, Klamath's Bill Christensen and Ashland's Provost.

Only two juniors cracked the first eleven, Mayfield and Blohm, while three second-year men made the second team, Mayfield, Jones and Christensen. The rest are seniors.

Narrow Margins
Only by the narrowest of margins did two first team backs, Jandreau and Wray, win out over a pair of their respective teammates, Provost and Stead. Jandreau and Wray, the forward-passing specialists for the Grizzlies and Tigers, each polled 11 points, while Stead, Medford's blocking back, and Provost, the conference scoring leader with 27 points, each got 10 points.

The backfield wasn't alone in developing a bitter fight for first team positions. Big Bill Wall, Medford's pass-snatching flanker and punter, barely nosed onto the first team with 10 points to the nine polled by Mayfield of Klamath Falls. John Bell, the other second team end, got seven points.

The guard positions were also hotly contested, with the first team pair, Mitchell and Rich, being closely pressed by the two Medfordites, Mitchell and Glenn. The Klamath duo each received 11 points, Glenn polled 10 and Mitchell nine. Mayfield and Fowler polled 11 and 10 points, respectively, to win their first team tackle posts from Herrin and Vogel, with eight and seven points. Blohm, first team center, got 11 points to six for Medford's Dan Winter, second team snapper-back.

Love, Orr Liked
Love and Orr were the best-liked backs among the coaches and writers balloting, and would give the first team tremendous power down the middle and off tackle. Love can punt and pass, also, while Orr is a better-than-fair broken field runner. Love's best conference performance came in the Grants Pass game, which Klamath won by a score of 27 to 6. In this contest he ran 88 yards for a touchdown after intercepting a pass, bucked over another score and tossed a forward pass to Mayfield for still another.

It is fitting and proper that he should be named the first team captain, for throughout the season he inspired the Pelicans with his unflagging spirit, real ability and excellent sportsmanship.

Orr was Medford's chief "breakaway" threat on offense, in addition to being a very fine defensive back. He scored two touchdowns in that hysterical Klamath game, won by Medford, 32 to 21, one of them coming on an 80-yard run after receiving a pass, and the other on an aerial shot into the end zone.

Jandreau sparked the Ashland attack all season, and despite his 137 pounds was a tough, rugged runner liable to go the distance at any time. His peak performance occurred in Ashland's 20 to 13 upset of Medford, when the little fellow fired two touchdown passes to Provost in completing seven out of 11 tosses. He also threw a scoring pass to Bill Elam when the Grizzlies blanked the Cavemen, 20 to 0.

Wray Spark Plug
Like Jandreau, Wray was Medford's passer de luxe and runner par excellence. He had a field day against Klamath, completing eight out of 13 passes for 96 yards, two of them resulting in touchdowns. Against Ashland he ripped off a 24-yard touchdown dash, and against Grants Pass, in Medford's 19 to 6 victory, he tallied on a six-yard run and threw a pass to Dippel for another six points.

That first team backfield would manufacture an amazingly diversified attack, with Love and Orr providing the power running and blocking, and Jandreau and Wray the aerial pyrotechnics and fancy stepping. It would be but slightly more potent than the second team backfield, however. Provost, who can run with the best of them as well as toss a pass when the occasion demands, and Christensen who can do the same two things, would keep the opposition guessing. Jones, who polled six points, is a powerful runner who performed brilliantly against Klamath Falls, and Stead is a knock-em-out blocker. Christensen, incidentally, polled seven points.

The two lines are almost equal in every respect. Wall and Hopkins were largely responsible for the success of Medford's passing attack, but Mayfield and Bell also were excellent flankers. All four were capable defensive wingmen. Mayfield and Fowler at the tackles were defensive giants in the Medford and Ashland forward walls, as were Herrin and Vogel in the Ashland and Klamath Falls lines.

MEDFORD COACHES GIVE PRAISE TO THE DALLES TEAM

Bowerman Calls Indians 'Finished Product,' 'Timing Perfect,' Says Kirtley.

Oregon State's Rose-Bowlers have predominated the sport news so much since last Saturday that it might be a good idea to ignore them for a minute or two in favor of a team which in its orbit has been just as outstanding.

Coach Charles McGuinness' the Dalles high school eleven walloped a powerful Medford—end make no mistake that Medford wasn't a whale of a football team—last Friday night, 28-0, and won the major claim to the state prep championship. Here's what Coach Bill Bowerman said about The Dalles after he recovered:

"The Dalles has the best football team that Medford has played since I started coaching in Southern Oregon. Furthermore—it's the first team this year that has been able to stop our running attack cold. 'You people of The Dalles (he was talking to Dalles Chronicle sportster Rod Finney) have been watching a finished product from end to end and from halfback to quarterback to fullback. Every man handled his assignment and handled it well.'"

Medford's backfield coach, Ed Kirtley, was just as extravagant in praise of the Mid-Columbia eleven: "If ever I've seen a high school team that looked like a college outfit, this is it. The Dalles could play almost any freshmen college squad in the country and beat them, as well. In all my 10 years as backfield coach at Medford this is the best balanced backfield I have ever watched perform. The timing and precision were perfect. 'Our passing attack was stopped because the Dalles line charged so fast that Cato Wray (passer) was rushed to find a receiver. Then, too, the Dalles line was so strong it could use a six-man defense and still let the Indian secondary stay far back and cover receivers.'"

Coming from men like Bowerman and Kirtley, that makes the Dalles sound a wee bit terrific, and sets one to wondering how many of those McGuinness players are seniors and where they will matriculate.

FLORITA FLATTENS HOSHINO IN FIRST

Los Angeles, Dec. 3.—(P)—Jimmy Florita, the little guy Harold Hoshino expected to KO to strengthen his hopes of a shot at the featherweight championship, knocked out Hoshino in just one minute, 21 seconds last night.

Hoshino, a Seattle Japanese with a record of 26 KO's in 37 scraps, was a 1-5 favorite to defeat Florita and a 1-2 choice to drop him for the 10-count.

Instead, after a minute of feinting, Florita ducked a left and right, then countered with a terrific right uppercut to Hoshino's chin. That was all. Florita, Los Angeles Filipino, weighed 130½; Hoshino 126½.

The Mail Tribune, as in the past, will issue award cards to all players on the first and second teams, and to those receiving honorable mention. The cards will designate the player's position and team, and will fit in a billfold.

Corvallis, Dec. 3.—(P)—The Oregon Wildlife Federation elected Elmer Church, Salem, as president yesterday.

Charles E. Jackson, Washington, D. C., assistant director of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, approved a proposal that Idaho, Washington and Oregon join the federal government in planning for an increase in the run of Columbia river salmon.

277 Minor Leaguers Inducted Into Army; Attendance Increases

Jacksonville, Fla., Dec. 3.—(P)—Two hundred and seventy-seven minor league players have been inducted into the country's armed forces within the last year, but as yet the game has not been seriously hurt by the draft, baseball's leaders were told today.

President William G. Bramham, opening the formal sessions of the 40th convention of the National Association of Professional Baseball leagues pointed out in his annual report that while this was a considerable loss in available playing talent, still it was short of the 358 players who were dropped through retirement or ineligibility during the year.

Offsetting this drain on players, 111 reinstatements were made.

President Bramham called attention to the generally sound condition of the minors—that all 41 leagues which started the 1941 season were able to complete their schedules and have qualified for the 1942 season and said that total attendance for 1941 was 15,000,000 a gain of more than 3,000,000 over 1940.
