Review Given At Study Club

Members of the Thursday Morning Study club heard a review of the life of Negley Farson, author and "Behind God's Back," one of his books, at a meeting at the Girls' Community clubhouse last week. Mrs. H. D. Dawson discussed the author and Mrs. Mark Wright, his book.

Farson, the grandson of a Yankee general during the Civil war, followed an adventurous life, such as his grandfather led in his march to the sea with Sherman. Farson had a varied education, participated in the R.A.F. in World War I, made his home in Montreal and from 1924 to 1934 was correspondent for the Chicago News service.

His book, "Behind God's Back," is a story of Africa and it is said that the author wrote the book because he foresaw the influence of that continent on the world today. He tells of the raw materials available, of the people, their reaction to the British rule; of the politics, Dutch and German colonists, the Belgian Congo, the land of the bushman and pigmy.

NAVY BOMBER IN CALIFORNIA CRASH

San Diego, Cal., Dec. 4.—(P)—A plane believed to have been a navy bomber, crashed in flames today two miles east of Poway, 30 miles northeast of here, Escondido police reported.

Lt. John Doherty, pilot attached to the Consolidated Aircraft Corporation's army test flight division, flew over and helped locate the wreckage, keeping in communication with Escondido police.

Doherty said all aboard the plane—the exact number had not been determined—were reported killed.

Portland Housing Situation Acute

Portland, Dec. 4.—(P)—Portland's housing situation is becoming acute with only 120 to 130 houses for rent, C. M. Gartell said today.

The defense housing committee chairman said the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation planned to add 3000 workers to

boost its launchings from one to two a week, but that the workers would find no houses within six miles of the plant.
