

CHAIRMAN URGES USE OF SEALS ON CHRISTMAS MAIL

Miss Bullis Cites Origin of Health Seals in Reminding Public to Cooperate.

Report of the Medford post-office, revealing a great increase this year in the load of early Christmas mail, brought a reminder yesterday from Miss Helen Bullis, Jackson county chairman of the seal sale to combat tuberculosis. The reminder was to Jackson county people, urging them to see that the heavy load of mail carries with it the healthful message of the Christmas seal. Its presence, Miss Bullis said, will not spell extra work for the postal clerks and every letter, which carries it, will represent one more penny spent in the campaign to eradicate tuberculosis.

The history of the Christmas seal, Miss Bullis pointed out, is so closely connected with mail and postal clerks that seal sale workers seldom think of letters without thinking of seals. In 1903 Einar Holboell, a postal clerk in Copenhagen, Denmark, in the rush of Christmas mail, thought how easily the rich and poor alike could build a hospital for tuberculous children if each letter carried a small penny stamp of the season's greetings. His idea crystallized into a plan, which was readily approved by the postal authorities and sanctioned by the royal family. The next Christmas the Danish people built the hospital through the generous response to the first Christmas seal sale for philanthropic purpose.

The seal came to America on a letter to Jacob Rills of New York, author, reporter and a pioneer in the field of social service. He wrote an article on the subject. It was read by Miss Emily Bissell, who designed a Christmas seal and borrowed \$40 to pay for printing 50,000 of them. The first Christmas seal sale in America opened on December 7, 1907. In 1908 it was general with 6000 newspapers cooperating to tell the nation what a weapon the penny seal could be in the fight against tuberculosis.

The newspapers of the nation are still cooperating. The fact that the tuberculosis death rate among unskilled workers is seven times higher than that among professional workers shows the value of that educational campaign. The unskilled workers do not read so much as the skilled.

Large Saving Gifed In Higher Education

Portland, Dec. 4.—(P)—R. L. Collins, budget officer, said yesterday the Oregon system of higher education saved \$3,282,505 in tax money in the eight years since unification compared with the eight preceding years.

Manager E. G. Young reported. Time for making reservations for the show will expire the last of this week.

The exhibit from the greatest distance so far registered consists of a display of six standard bronze birds from the flock of Herbert Brohman, Sanborn, N. D. Exhibitors from all parts of Oregon and western Washington also have filed entries. The list of exhibitors so far completed also includes a large number of Douglas county breeders who will offer entries for the first time, Young advises.

The show, opening Tuesday next, will continue through Saturday, December 13.

MATLACK WINNER IN NATION-WIDE PUBLICITY STUNT

Craterian Manager to Spend Fortnight at Sun Valley With All Expenses Paid.

"It Happened In Sun Valley." That's the song Jack Matlack, manager of the Craterian theater, was singing today. And it won't be long before it will be happening to Matlack in Sun Valley, America's newest sports center and vacationland in Idaho.

Yes, Jack was one of five winners throughout the country in the 20th Century-Fox Film corporation's contest to publicize its Sonja Henie picture "Sun Valley Serenade." Today Jack had a telegram in his pocket notifying him that he was one of the winners. The prize? A fortnight's, all-expense-paid vacation for two at Sun Valley. Jack thinks he'll take his vacation in February.

Two thousand or more theater managers all over the country participated in the promotional campaign. Matlack put on his show the night of October 29 when Sun Valley Serenade opened its run at the Craterian. This Sonja Henie skating picture was tied in with the inaugural of southern Oregon's 1941-42 winter sports season, the Rogue Snowmen sponsoring what turned out to be the most gala and glittering parade seen here in years. GLIDER FLYING GETS IMPETUS IN MINNESOTA

St. Paul, Minn.—(AP)—Ted Bellak, director of Minnesota's glider training program, predicts that the army and navy soon will use gliders towed behind troop transport planes to haul military equipment.

Bellak, who holds the world's cross-water glider flight record, believes the use of gliders by the German Luftwaffe in the Crete campaign last spring has opened new fields for gliders and sailplanes by the nation's armed forces.

Bellak was appointed recently as director of the first state glider training program in the nation.

The necessity of training thousands of pilots, Bellak said, has stimulated interest in glider training.

"Russia's great showing against a superior German air force is largely due to extensive training with gliders and other motionless aircraft," he said.

"I've found that virtually all of the boys I have trained in glider and sail plane flying have gone on to become regular pilots. And they find the early training invaluable in power flying."

The army and navy, he said, have ordered several 10-passenger sailplanes constructed as a result of the success the German air force has obtained in transporting parachute troops and light artillery.

Local Air Traffic Shows Big Growth

An increase of more than 60 percent in local passenger traffic was recorded here by United Air Lines last month as compared with business in November last year, it was shown by figures released today by Max C. Henne, manager.

Last month 211 passengers arrived at Medford municipal airport by United Mainliners and 195 departed, a total of 406. In the same 1940 month 117

passengers arrived and 134 departed, a total of 251.
