Menus of the Day

Dinner

Serving 2 or 3

Salmon, Rice Mold

Creamed Asparagus

Graham Bread Grape Butter

Apple Fruit Salad

Sunshine Pie Coffee

Salmon Rice Mold

1 cup boiled rice

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup butter, melted

1 cup salmon

1/2 cup chopped parsley

1/2 cup lemon juice

1/2 cup buttered crumbs

2 tablespoons milk

Mix rice with salt and melted butter. Place in buttered baking dish. Cover with rest of ingredients. Bake 35 minutes in moderate oven (350). Surround with creamed asparagus, savory or egg sauce.

Apple Fruit Salad

2/3 cup diced apples

1/2 cup shredded cabbage

1/2 cup diced peaches or pears

1/2 cup chopped parsley

1/2 cup salad dressing

Chill ingredients. Combine and serve on crisp lettuce.

Sunshine Pie

3 cups cooked dried apricots

2/3 cup sugar

1/3 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1/2 cup orange juice

1/2 cup apricot juice

1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind

1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind

1/2 teaspoon cloves

3 tablespoons butter

Pie crust

Mix apricots with sugar, flour and salt. Add juices, rinds and cloves. Cook slowly, stirring constantly, until it thickens. Add butter, cool slightly and pour into unbaked pie crust. Crispen, half-inch pastry strips over top. Bake 10 minutes in a moderately hot oven (425). Lower heat and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven (350).
