Foot of Snow—Twelve inches of snow covered the ground at headquarters building in Crater Lake national park at noon yesterday. It was reported by short-wave radio. Snow was falling at the time of the 8:45 a. m. broadcast but had stopped at the time of the noon broadcast. Minimum temperature Friday night was 28. The mercury stood at 34 degrees yesterday noon. The sky was partly overcast. Roads were slippery and motorists were advised to have chains in their cars in case they were needed.

First Flight—The first United Mainliner to call at Salem Friday as plane service to the state capital was inaugurated amid special ceremonies brought five pouches of mail to Medford. This plane, stopping at Salem at 1:05 p. m. on signal, ordinarily does not carry mail but special permission was obtained to move the mail on the inaugural flight because of the chance that the regular night mail plane might not have been able to stop on account of unfavorable weather. Most of the first-flight mail was composed of stamp collectors' items. Several stamp collectors here received mail on the first flight. The five pouches contained 114 pounds of mail. The mail was stamped at Salem with a special cachet.
