Rome, Dec. 6.—(AP)—King Vittorio Emanuele narrowly escaped a British air raid Thursday at San Giovanni, on the toe of the Italian boot, where he was en route home from a nine-day visit to British-bombed places in Sicily, it was disclosed today upon the monarch's return to Rome.
