

LA GUARDIA IRKED BY WIRE PHOTOS OF HOME CROWDS

'Somebody Going To Catch Hell' When He Gets Back In New York, Says Mayor

Alaska's first air raid warning, official concern over arrow-shaped fire beacons near Port Angeles, and accelerated home defense preparations under direction of New York's Mayor Fiorello La Guardia were developments today after the Pacific northwest's third night of modified blackout.

Reports at least one unidentified plane was flying over Alaska prompted four air raid alarms at Anchorage, location of an army air base. Schools were kept closed, streets were cleared for several hours and planes took to the air from the Anchorage base.

Rumors Denied

Later the Fort Richardson public relations office denied rumors, which it said were circulated in the states, that bombs had been dropped in Alaska.

Reports differed on significance of the Port Angeles fire beacons seen Tuesday night and again Wednesday. From Washington it was said the army was investigating fifth column activity in connection with the flares. At Olympia, Ross Cunningham, assistant to Governor Langlie, said identity of the white persons who set the fires was known but that no arrests were made and the state was not working on the case. He also said army officers regarded the shape of the fires as "coincidence."

Little Flower Irked

La Guardia conferred in Seattle with mayors, police chiefs and fire chiefs from the Puget sound blackout area. He warned that "confusion, disorder and panic can do more damage than bombs."

The fiery "Little Flower" admitted he was "embarrassed and humiliated" on seeing wire photos of New York City crowds standing in groups during yesterday's air raid alarms there.

"Won't somebody catch hell about this when I get home?"

"Here I go around the country telling people they must stay inside during air raid alarms. And right in my own city this happens—this," he emphasized, flourishing the news picture.

"Why won't people realize that our whole coast, the Atlantic, the gulf and the Pacific, for 300 miles inland, is a target area?"

Other developments: Aberdeen city councils passed ordinances dealing with blackout violations.

Lyle F. Watis, regional forester at Portland, said the U.S. forest service had taken steps to aid in northwest defense, with rangers and lookouts acting as airplane spotters.

PERSHING OFFERS TO SERVE AGAIN

NAVY VESSEL AND FREIGHTER CRASH

New Bedford, Mass., Dec. 11.—(AP)—At least eight bodies and several survivors from the freighter Oregon were brought into this port today, approximately 24 hours after the vessel went to the bottom following a collision with a U. S. navy ship.

The collision occurred before dawn yesterday, approximately 20 miles off Nantucket, just south of Cape Cod, but the Oregon stayed afloat for several hours and did not go to the bottom until long after daylight.

Groceries and general cargoes had not been emptied from the warehouses since the last boats delivered them at Nome, he said. Although the next boats are not due in Nome until June 10, he expressed the belief there would be no food shortage.
