Japs Detained at Terminal Island



Several score Japanese were taken into custody by federal bureau of investigation officers when a ferry from Terminal Island, on which are located a number of naval establishments, docked at San Pedro, Calif. They were herded into a wire enclosure for questioning and were guarded by troops from nearby Fort MacArthur.

Singapore Landing Made by Survivors of British Warships

Singapore, Dec. 11.—(P)—More than 2,000 survivors officially reported rescued from the sunken British warships Prince of Wales and Repulse arrived here today after destroyers and other units worked all night picking them out of the China sea. Some 3,000 men were aboard the two big ships. The full story of what happened still was not available, but crew members of the Repulse said the first Japanese bomb struck the 32,000-ton Repulse on its airplane catapult deck. Gunners were knocked down and killed in the blasts on both ships, but others quickly manned their stations and continued to blaze away at the attacking waves of planes despite the ships' mortal wounds, they said. At least seven Japanese planes were shot down, the survivors said, before the commanders ordered the men over the sides of the sinking ships.

Churchill Says Hitler Made Big Blunder in Attack On Russians

London, Dec. 11.—(P)—Prime Minister Churchill spoke gravely today of United States and British naval losses in the Pacific and the Far East, declared Adolf Hitler committed a colossal blunder in attacking Soviet Russia, and predicted ultimate British victory in north Africa despite unexpected reverses. "It may well be," he declared in a sweeping review of the broadened war, "that we shall have to suffer considerable punishment, but we shall defend ourselves everywhere with the utmost vigor and in close cooperation with the United States and Netherlands navy. "No one can underestimate the gravity of losses inflicted on the United States nor underestimate the length of time it will take to marshal the great forces necessary in the Far East for absolute victory."

Officer William W. O'Brien found a dummy of Tojo, Japanese premier, hanging from a pole the previous night. He took it to the police station where both dummies reposed today. No report was made on the police blotter as to who found the Hitler dummy, the omission probably being intended so as not to divulge valuable information to the enemy.

The most important neutrals include: Argentina, Brazil, Bulgaria, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Mexico, Paraguay, Peru, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, Uruguay, and Venezuela.

San Francisco, Dec. 11.—(P)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt will leave for the Pacific northwest on her nation-wide tour by train at 5 p. m. tonight, unless clearing weather will permit her to fly north tomorrow. She will be in Portland tomorrow night, in Tacoma Saturday and at Seattle Sunday, meeting at all points with civilian councils on defense.
