Blackout Hint—Clarence Crank, 25 Portland avenue, suggested today the use of showered water paint on windows as a good blackout measure. Mr. Crank explained that dark colors in shower paint, if applied with several thicknesses on the inside of windows, were an effective means of assuring blackout. The paint may be washed off when it is no longer needed. He said, however, not to use it on outside of windows as contact with water removed its effectiveness.

Dawn Delayed—Hugo Frohreich, former Medford resident now living at Grants Pass, reported in Grants Pass that his hens had trouble yesterday finding their nests in the dark and as a result their eggs were scattered everywhere. His hens are accustomed to waking up at 6 a. m. when the electric lights are turned on but blackout postponed their dawn and the hens awoke in the dark. Because they couldn't find their nests in the prolonged darkness they scattered their eggs about the poultry farm, Frohreich said.

To Join Navy—Ten men are expected to leave by train tonight for Portland to take final medical examinations for enlistment in the U. S. navy. If they pass, they will go into recruit training immediately at the San Diego, Cal., naval station. Eight men left for Portland last night to take the final physical check-up. No Early Mass—There will be no 6:30 mass in Sacred Heart church Sunday. The 6:30 mass during the week has also been discontinued until further notice. The change in the regular schedule was made so that everyone might be enabled to cooperate with blackout regulations, announcement from the church said. Until further notice, the Sunday masses will be at 8 and 10:30.

Earlier Dances—Dancing at Dreamland hall will begin at 8 p. m. Saturday and close at midnight, W. W. Walker, manager of the hall, said today. Earlier dancing hours will enable the public to return home before the time of blackout for this city, Walker said. The change in hours was made in order to cooperate with the Jackson County Council of Defense, he stated.

Defense Aid—Thomas C. Parker, assistant superintendent of Crater Lake national park, said today that employees in the park are cooperating 100 percent in national defense by manning three aircraft warning posts on 24-hour schedules. All work is voluntary with employees of the park taking their shifts during the night and carrying on usual employment during the day, he stated. Eighteen employees reside at the park during the winter months, carrying on the work and snow plow activities. Of this group 15 are married and the posts are manned during the day by their wives.
