

# HEIGHTS OF VALOR SHOWN IN DEFENSE IS HAWAII STORY

### Relaxing of Censorship Permits Partial Picture of Jap Attacks On Islands.

Honolulu, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Dahu Island's defenders rose to magnificent heights of valor in the face of six vicious raids on this Pacific outpost by Japanese warplanes last Sunday.

The sudden stab has left them fighting mad.

Fifty to 100 enemy planes participated in the savage thrust at Pearl Harbor naval base, the Hickman Field army base and the Kaneohe naval air base.

The first wave came over at 7:55 a. m. local time, followed by other waves at 11:29 a. m., 11:59 a. m., 7:15 p. m. and 9:15 p. m.

A slight relaxation of censorship yesterday permitted additional details of the raids which killed 48 civilians and injured more than 100.

**3,000 Toll Reported.**

In Washington the White House announced army, navy and civilian casualties probably would total 3,000, about equally divided in killed and wounded.

Martial law was proclaimed after the raids and the civilian population, calm and deter-

mined, is cooperating splendidly with the military authorities.

Marvin Vitousek, 17, and his father perhaps were the first to see the enemy attack.

"Suddenly we were in the thick of a black-painted mass of planes," Martin said. "They rocketed from the sky everywhere and I saw on the wing-tips the rising sun of Japan. When the first bomb hit, my heart almost went out of me. Then all hell broke loose."

He said he saw three enemy planes shot down.

Honoluluans, accustomed to army and navy maneuvers, thought it was just another defense practice when they were awakened by the explosions.

Pearl Harbor was almost blacked out by heavy smoke and high over-head bombers roared amid intense anti-aircraft fire.

While I was approaching the office a bomb exploded less than 100 feet away from a hardware store and nearby another bomb killed a man. One direct on an automobile killed its four occupants instantly.

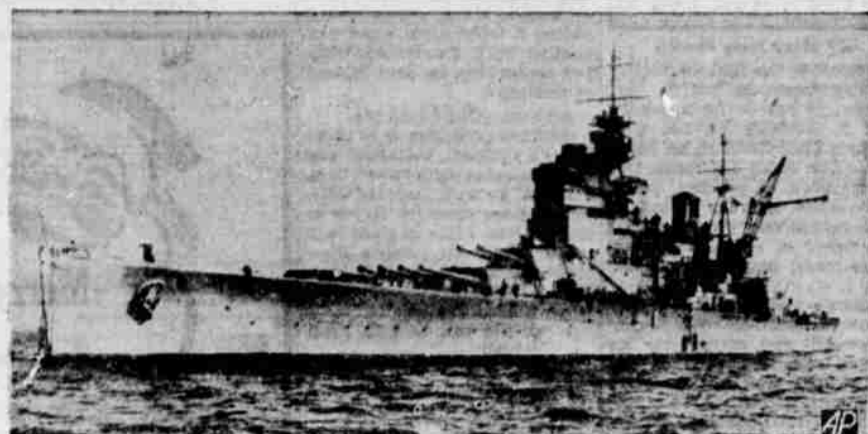
Police handled the civilian situation beautifully in the emergency.

**No New Raids**

Army authorities said today that there have been no new Japanese air raids against the Hawaiian Islands since Sunday night.

The control of the fighting forces and of contractors and civilian employees at army and navy facilities subjected to the Japanese attacks drew high praise today from Admiral Husband E. Kimmel, commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet and Rear Admiral Claude C. Bloch, commandant of the 14th naval district.

"We American can receive hard blows but can deliver harder ones," they said in a joint statement.

The navy department has announced that Secretary of the Navy Knox had arrived in Honolulu. Presumably he will inspect air-raid damage.

The Japanese Consul was taken into custody while he was burning records after the initial attack.

Dangerous areas were evacuated and schools ordered closed.

## TEN MORE LEAVE FOR BOEING JOBS

Ten more members of the defense vocational class in aviation sheet metal here were to leave today for employment at the Boeing aircraft plant in Seattle. More than 100 of this class have now been employed by Boeing and Lockheed in Southern California.

The ten leaving here were Paul Atkins, C. L. Cullley Ray Colbert, Ross Goodroad, Eugene Helms, R. C. Meyers, Adolph Norden and Billy Long, all of Medford, C. J. Bailey of Ashland and Harvey Maxson of Talent.

Through the state employment service, E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, was asked to supply ten members of the class who had at least 90 hours of instruction. None of the ten chosen had less than 108 hours, Mr. Hedrick said. The full course is for 360 hours but the aircraft companies often call for the students before the end of the course and give them the rest of their training at the factories while they are on payroll.

The aviation sheet metal class will be restored to full membership immediately by enrollment of ten from the waiting list of 65 or 70, Mr. Hedrick said.

## ARMY, NAVY COIN GIVEN APPROVAL

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The senate gave its approval today to a supplemental army and navy appropriations bill carrying \$10,572,350,000 in cash and contract authority for a tremendous acceleration in military activities.

Consolidating \$1,558,498,000 lease-lend appropriations into an over-all fund of \$7,378,000,000 for the war department, the senate sent the measure back to the house for action on \$2,328,309,000 in increases over the previously-approved house figure.

Final enactment would boost total defense and lease-lend appropriations to approximately \$70,000,000,000 in the last two years.

The senate made three large additions to the bill on the floor, adding \$290,000,000 for temporary defense housing, \$100,000,000 for military aviation landing fields and \$68,000,000 for new civilian airports.

## CASUALTY LIST USE IS ADVISD AGAINST

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told his press conference today that newspapers and the radio should refrain from using war casualty lists in full, that is, compilations of names of those dead or wounded.

Mr. Roosevelt said that relatives will be notified of casualties as soon as possible but that he felt it best to keep accumulations of casualties out of print because it was possible for the enemy to use them to gain information.

## CONGRESS AGREES TO SPEED ACTION ON WAR TAX BILL

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Congressional leaders agreed today to go to work immediately to draft legislation for "several billion dollars" of new war taxes.

The announcement was made by Chairman R. L. Doughton of the house ways and means committee and Chairman Walter F. George of the senate finance committee following a luncheon conference with Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr.

Neither of the congressmen would predict when final passage could be expected.

"We are going ahead as expe-

ditiously as humanly possible to do a good job," Doughton said. "But this is a big subject and we feel we will save time by making thorough preparations. We can't operate recklessly or blindly."

## JACKSON KIN SAFE IN HAWAII, WORD

Additional residents here were today in receipt of word of the safety of relatives in the Pacific war zone.

Glenn L. Jackson, president of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, had word that his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Burns, were safe in Honolulu where they have resided for six or seven years. Mr. Burns is employed by the Associated Press.
