

PUBLIC ASSISTING IN CLOTHING LIST FOR EMERGENCIES

Splendid cooperation has been received from the public thus far in making inventories of clothing and bedding that would be available in an emergency, it was stated today by Adjutant Charles K. Cox, chairman of this work for the Jackson County Council of Defense.

The clothing and bed covers are not wanted now, however, Adjutant Cox emphasized again in response to many inquiries he has received. All that is needed now is a list of what would be available in time of need, he pointed out. So far as the return of articles is concerned after they have been put to use, an

effort will be made to restore such things as quilts if they are identified with a tag, Adjutant Cox said, adding, however, that this is a detail that can be settled when and if any emergency arises.

For the time being the defense council merely wants a list giving this information: Name, address and telephone number of the person who has spare clothing and bedding; description of the clothing and bedding; notation of the size of clothing and shoes; specification as to whether the clothing is for men, women or children.

This information should be written out simply and legibly and mailed to Adjutant Cox at the Salvation Army, P. O. Box 467, Medford, the adjutant said.

Committee members today started the work of dividing Medford and the rest of the county into districts to facilitate organizational procedure in case of emergency, Adjutant Cox said.

DRAFT REGISTRY TO BE EXTENDED 19 TO 44 YEARS

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—A war department bill to extend the draft registration to men from 18 through 64 and to make men from 19 through 44 subject to military training was introduced in the house today and sponsors said it would be approved quickly.

Chairman May (D-Ky.) announced that the house military committee would start hearings tomorrow and predicted that the members would send it on to the house in a few hours.

Speaker Rayburn, after a conference with Secretary of War Stimson and General Lewis B. Hershey, selective service head, said the legislation would make men from 19 to 45 "responsible for service."

DAWN LANDINGS IN SOUTHERN LUZON JAPANESE CLAIM

Tokyo, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Official radio received by AP—Japanese troops succeeded in landing before dawn today in southern Luzon while in naval operations around the Philippines that Japanese navy has lost a minesweeper and suffered damage to a light cruiser and another minesweeper, imperial headquarters communique reported.

"Human torpedo" tactics by Japanese naval aviators were announced officially in a communique of the navy section of imperial headquarters, broadcast by Domei, which said:

"Nine Japanese naval planes have been lost. Their crews rammed their objective. One aircraft is missing."

Against these air losses the navy section communique said that 202 United States warplanes had been destroyed, including 77 shot down, since the beginning of operations against the Philippines.

The cruiser admitted harmed was only slightly damaged, the

official report asserted, and continued to take part in operations. One minesweeper suffered heavy damage, it added. Most of the crew of the minesweeper announced sunk was said to have been rescued.

PARALYSIS FATAL
La Grande, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Lawton Stearns, 39, of La Grande, died Wednesday of infantile paralysis after several days in an iron lung rushed here from Nampa, Idaho. The widow and two children survive.

JAPANESE DENT BRITISH FRONT

Singapore, Dec. 12.—(AP)—A British communique admitted tonight that strong Japanese attacks had dented British defense

lines in the jungles along the Malaya-Thailand frontier and said heavy fighting continued.

The penetrations, however, were described as local.

The British, meanwhile, struck back by air at the bases from which the Japanese drove south into Malaya.

The war bulletin said the port of Songkha (Singora) on the east coast of Thailand 50 miles north of the Malaya frontier was bombed during the morning.

"All machines returned safely," the communique said, "but owing to ground mist it was difficult to estimate the damage inflicted."

PINE CUT EBBS

Portland, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Western pine mills cut 64,290,000 board feet of lumber during the week ending December 6, the Western Pine association said today. This compared with a 70,494,000 foot cut

the previous week and 71,820,000 for the same week last year. Orders in that order were 62,614,000 board feet, 71,681,000 and 71,380,000; shipments, 66,705,000 board feet, 76,066,000 and 87,755,000.
