NAZIS WILL SEND ALL WRITERS HOME

Berlin, Dec. 13. — (Official Radio Received by AP)—American correspondents who were taken into protective custody when Germany and the United

States went to war will leave Berlin with United States diplomats. But until exchange conditions are arranged they will stay at a south German spa. This course was decided on after assurances were received that the United States would treat German correspondents in like fashion. Swiss diplomats are assuming German interests in the United States and United States interests in Germany.

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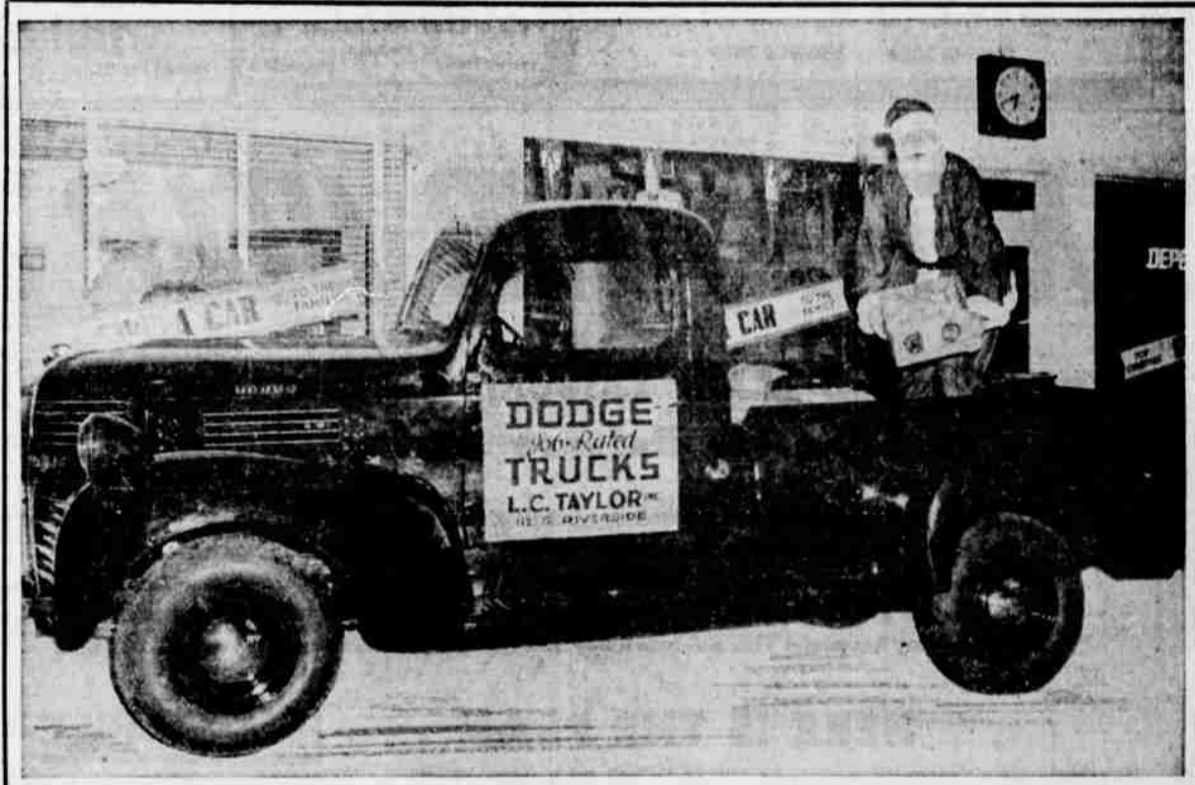
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
