

# East-West Gridiron Classic Transferred to New Orleans

## CLIMATE FACTOR IN TAKING TILT TO TULANE GRID

### San Francisco And Shreveport Shriner Groups To Divide Hospitals' Funds.

Chicago, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Andy Kerr of Colgate university, announced today that the annual East-West football game will be played at New Orleans January 3, 1942, instead of San Francisco, January 1.

Kerr, who with Bernie Bierman of Minnesota, and Dudley De Groot of the University of Rochester, coaches the East squad, said the game removed from the west coast because of the war, would be played in Tulane university's stadium, and in cooperation with the Sugar Bowl sports carnival.

Kerr said that climate was the determining factor in moving the game to New Orleans rather than to one of the several northern cities which had bid for the game, coupled with "the fine, cooperative spirit of the Sugar Bowl people."

Proceeds of the game will be divided between the San Francisco Shrine group which founded and has staged the game for 16 years for the benefit of its hospital for crippled children, and the Shrine hospital for crippled children at Shreveport, La., Kerr said.

The San Francisco shrine will manage the game, he said. The game, between picked squads of eastern and western stars, will follow by two days the Sugar Bowl game between Fordham and Missouri New Year's day.

## Rose Bowl Fathers Have Worst Worry In Ticket Refunds

Pasadena, Calif., Dec. 15.—(AP)—Fathers of the Rose Bowl football game tenderly tucked the big stadium away in mothballs for the duration today and prepared to shift their New Year's day classic in an unprecedented move to far away Durham, N. C.

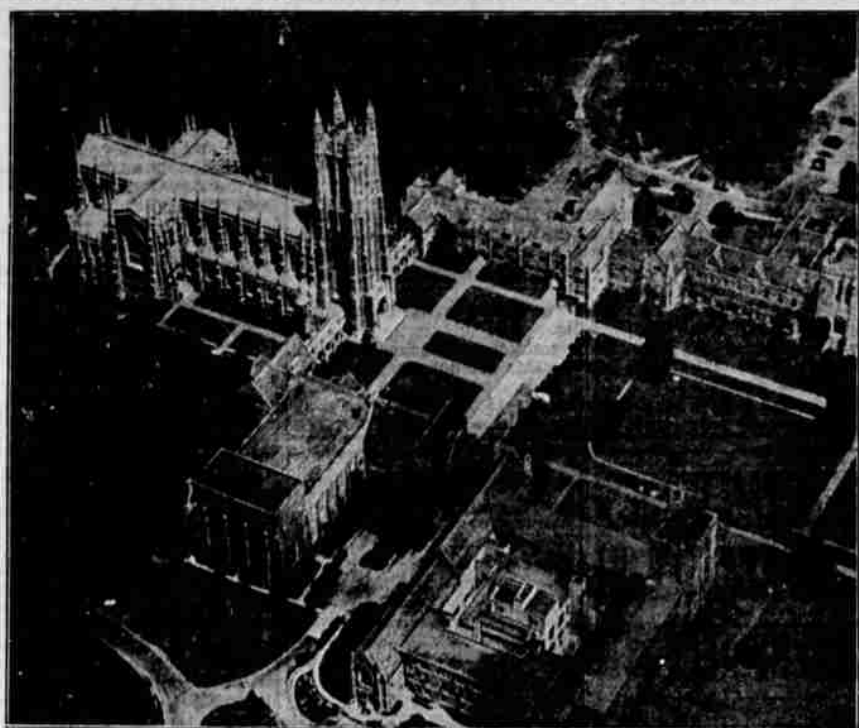
Head Coach Loh Stiner is slated to escort his squad of Beavers from Corvallis, Ore., Friday to Durham, arriving four days later.

Biggest headache and financial worry, of course, involved the stacks of tickets bought and paid for here, but Oregon State authorities announced that refunds would be made as soon as a 30-man office staff can handle them.

Duke authorities indicated they face the same problem Oregon State did here; namely, crowding too many spectators into limited seating capacity. The Rose Bowl seats 90,000, the Duke stadium, with additions, 52,000.

Division of gate receipts was another matter unanswered out here. Ordinarily, Duke would have collected around \$100,000, and Oregon State, under the new setup, might have received approximately \$37,000, which was what Stanford got in the 1941 game with Nebraska.

## Heart of Duke's Gothic Campus



Duke University's Blue Devils will play host January 1 to Oregon State College's Beavers on the gothic campus at Durham, N. C., instead of the two teams journeying to the Pasadena, Calif., Rose Bowl. ## OREGON HOOPERS TOPPLE TEMPLE BY 35-29 SCORE

Philadelphia, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Oregon swept to a 35 to 29 victory over Temple here last night after finding the key to Temple's zone defense. About 4,300 spectators saw the game in Convention hall.

Bob Wren paced the Webfoots with five field goals and two fouls for 12 points.

Temple held a slim 13-10 edge at halftime, but once Oregon got the range in the second half there was no doubt about the outcome. The Owls managed to stay within striking distance until the last five minutes before Paul and Lloyd Jackson contributed five points to sew up the decision.

## ACHESON DRILLS TIGER QUINT FOR FRIDAY JAMBOREE

### Teams From Klamath Falls, Ashland, Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford to Vie.

Russ Acheson sent his Tiger basketballers into their final week of drilling today in preparation for the Southern Oregon basketball conference jamboree that will be staged this coming Friday commencing at 7:30 p. m. This is the first time all schools of the major loop have consented to meet on one floor for a pre-season get-together. Cagers from Klamath Falls, Ashland, Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford will all be present, each team participating in four games during the evening.

The jamboree is to be an annual affair in southern Oregon with a different school acting as host to visiting teams each year. The primary purpose behind this meeting, it was announced, is to acquaint coaches and teams with officials for the coming basketball year and to stimulate interest in basketball in southern Oregon. "This will be the only opportunity for fans to see the entire conference in action during a single evening," Coach Acheson stated, "and all who are interested in basketball should not miss the opportunity of seeing this preview of the coming season."

Awards have been purchased and the grand winner of the evening is to be selected on a percentage basis. An award will also be made to the teams judged superior in offensive and defensive tactics. During the intermission an individual foul-throwing contest will be conducted. Each squad is to be represented by an individual player, who will make five attempts at each basket, making a total of 20 throws. The player who completes the largest number will be accredited as district champion.

## SANTA ANITA ON BLACKOUT LIST

Los Angeles, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Santa Anita's most pretentious race season apparently is over before it started.

The vast plant, Mecca of winter racing and pointed for the biggest meeting of its fabulous career, joined the growing list of major sports attractions banned by the government for reasons of national safety.

Its grand opening December 31, which was to have started on a star-studded, gold-mounted 35-day roll, was cancelled yesterday.

## Oldest Grid Extravaganza Prepares for Durham Shift

Durham, N. C., Dec. 16.—(AP)—The scene of football's oldest and biggest extravaganza—the Rose Bowl game—shifted cross country today to the land of tobacco.

War cancelled the big New Year's day contest between Duke university and Oregon State as far as the huge Rose Bowl stadium, the Tournament of Roses and Pasadena are concerned.

Military expediency demanded blackout of the game on the California coast. Sixty thousand tickets had been sold for approximately \$264,000. The money will be refunded by individual check with Oregon State assuming the postage bill. Rose Bowl officials hope to recover at Durham \$30,000 already spent on game preliminaries.

Fast on the heels of the announcement that the game would be played here as an official Rose Bowl engagement, came word from civic leaders that a celebration, though not as elaborate as the Tournament of Roses at Pasadena, was in the making.

Duke stadium will seat more than 50,000 persons and tickets will sell for \$4.40 apiece. The Tournament of Roses will get its cut and probably determine how the remainder will be divided.

## PREP MENTOR IS HUSKY CANDIDATE

Seattle, Dec. 16.—(AP)—A new popular Seattle high school coach tossed his hat into the ring today as the first openly avowed candidate for the University of Washington football coaching post.

Leon Brigham, whose Garfield high school eleven have won eight city prep titles in the past 12 years, said he was applying for the grid position left open by the termination of Coach Jimmy Phelan's contract summarily last Saturday.

Brigham, a one-time Iowa quarterback under Coach Howard Jones, and later assistant coach there, has been mentioned often by members of the Seattle football fans' camp who favor giving a home product a chance instead of importing a "big name" coach.

## SOCCER OUTCLASSES ALBANY COLLEGE

Ashland, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Southern Oregon College of Education outclassed Albany college of Portland in an Oregon intercollegiate conference basketball game last night, 43 to 20.

The win, Southern Oregon's third straight, advanced the Ashland team to a tie with Oregon College of Education for the loop lead.
